Recommendations for Successful Transition to College

- Communication with high school counselors and college admissions advisors early and often.
 - Apply early!
 - Institutions are here to guide students on the next steps.
 - Ask about special programs and student support programs and services while in high school.
- Institutions are committed to reaching out and welcoming students.
- Ask guestions and seek clarity.
- Remember, Yes You Can!

Holistic Admissions

- Each Washington public baccalaureate institution considers the whole student in the admissions review process.
- Holistic admissions consider grades, courses both the type and the level at which taken along with other
 information to make an admissions decision. This may include leadership in activities outside of the school
 environment or other examples a student may provide.
- Every application goes through a holistic assessment process, even if the student applying has not met the state's admissions standards policy.

SAT and ACT and Admissions

All Washington public baccalaureate institutions permanently test optional. Students will not be penalized during the admissions process or student eligibility for institutionally supported scholarships, course placement or admissions to Honors programs.

Test Not Considered: Institutions do not consider test scores, nor are test scores considered at any point in the admissions review process, even if a student chooses to submit a test score. No additional, alternative measure of college readiness is required in place of a test score.

Test Not Required: Institutions do not consider test scores in the admissions review process, even if a student chooses to submit a test score (see test not considered above). However, test scores may be considered for placement, entry into Honors program, and/or scholarship awards.

Test Optional: Students may choose to submit test scores to strengthen an application. Not submitting test scores will not disadvantage a student. In place of a test score, students who apply may be required to submit additional and alternative measures of college readiness such as successful completion of dual credit coursework, exams, or scores on high school college readiness assessments.

Applying to College

All Washington public baccalaureate institutions have **joined the Common App**. Students and families through the Common App have the option to complete a single admissions application for our state's public, four-year institutions.

Guaranteed Admissions (WAGAP)

The Washington Guaranteed Admissions Program **supports admission opportunities** at participating Washington public, four-year institutions to increase college awareness and college going culture across the state for Washington students. To be eligible to participate in WAGAP districts or schools must provide a Letter of Support and complete a single data sharing agreement with all participating institutions of higher education. **To be eligible** for guaranteed admission students **must** meet or be on track by fall 2024 admissions to meet two requirements:

- Earn a 3.0 cumulative GPA AND
- Complete ALL Washington's College Academic Distribution Requirements (CADRs)

To be on track for CADRs, a student must have completed all CADRs by fall 2024 admissions. Some CADRs require completion in the senior year of high school. A student who has not yet but is expected to complete a CADR by fall 2024 admissions. **To learn more:** https://bit.ly/WaGap

What You Should Know about Washington Public Four-Year College and Universities

- Largest Produce of Bachelor's Degrees in Washington. We are the largest provider of bachelor's and graduate degrees in Washington, offering a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality baccalaureate, graduate, and professional degree completion.
- An Affordable, Accessible Option. The sector average admit rate is 83% for first-time, first year students. We rank in the top 10 for low average undergraduate tuition and fees among all states. In Washington the costs are lower than national trends, with in-state tuition averaging only \$7,485 for public four years, and \$7,388 for upper division and \$4,564 for lower division for community and technical colleges. And net costs to students are often lower once federal, state, and institutional aid are considered. Public four-year institutions rank 2nd in the nation for Pell Grant recipients. Fifty-three percent (53%) of the Class of 2020 graduated from a Washington baccalaureate degree-granting institution with no student loan debt.
- Serving an Increasingly Diverse Student Population. Over 80% are Washington residents. Nearly 50% identify as non-White. Over a third of students in the public four-year sector receive a Washington College Grant; 48% of College Bound Scholarship recipients attend a public four-year institution.
- Strong Commitment to Degree Completion. We rank 2nd in graduation rates for the West region for bachelor's degree-seeking students at public, four-year institutions. The six-year graduation rate for Washington public four-year institutions is 69%; national rate was 62%; WICHE states 64%. Time to degree is 4.02 years (average) and 3.75 years (median).
- Value Added. Bachelor's degree completion continues to be associated, in Washington and nationally, with increased lifetime earnings, lower unemployment rates, lower incidences of poverty, better health outcomes, longer life expectancy and higher rates of civic and social engagement.
- **Dynamic Education for Current and Future Careers.** Demand for workers with postsecondary credentials is higher than it has ever been. We continue to actively engage in the development and review of education pathways and credentials that lead to degrees and outcomes to respond effectively to the changing demands of the current and future workplace.
 - o Washington employers want to hire local talent to fill these positions whenever possible.
 - Fewer than 30% of job openings that pay a family-sustaining wage over the next 10-14 years will require only a high school diploma.
 - While many companies are considering or have started to drop bachelor's degree requirements for jobs, those cases make up 15 percent or less of the available jobs and still require individuals to have significant work experience and skills.
 - Earning a bachelor's degree is the only and best predicator within a student's control for earning a good wage in WA.
 - Participation in college can make up disadvantages such as poverty, racism and other structural barriers based on the social capital provided, access to high-quality learning experiences and access to high impact programs (e.g., internships, study abroad, research).



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Independent Colleges of Washington campuses are **serving Washington** by offering unique higher educational environments and holistic support for state residents on their journeys to **completing degrees**. Together, we are **cultivating talent**, **championing diversity**, and making it possible for more Washington residents to find the college or university that best meets their individual needs here in their home state. 
About Our Campuses

- Independent Colleges of Washington campuses collectively educate approximately 35,000 students.
- We enroll students from all 39 Washington counties, all 49 sister states along with the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and Guam, and more than 80 countries.
- Our graduates make up approximately 20% of new bachelor's and graduate degree earners in Washington each year. In some fields, we are powerhouse producers, conferring 40% of graduate degrees in education, for example, and 50% of nursing graduate degrees in Washington.
- If taken together, ICW campuses would be one of the 20 top private employers in Washington, employing a higher number of employees than Kaiser Permanente in the state; together we employ more people in the state than do Google, Expedia, or Comcast.
- Between 2010 and 2020, institutional aid from ICW member campuses has nearly doubled.
- ICW campuses have some of the highest graduation rates; completion rates at Washington independent colleges are 83% versus the national average of 62%.

 More than four in 10 students across the ICW membership identify as Black, Indigenous, or persons of color.

- Approximately 40% of our undergraduates qualify for need-based federal and/or state grant aid and work study, such as the Washington College Grant.
- One in five students are first in their families to earn a college degree.
- Approximately one in three students transfer credits from other institutions.
- More than one in four (28%) of our undergraduate and graduate students are older than 25.
- Approximately 1,000 ICW students are veterans.




Moving Towards a Statewide Universal High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP) Platform

The High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP) is a state graduation requirement. Each student must have a HSBP to guide the student's high school experience and prepare the student for postsecondary education or training and career (ESHB 2224, Chapter 31, Laws of 2017). This bill now requires that **students start their plan by <u>seventh</u> grade** and then continue to revise them throughout middle and high school to accommodate changing interests or educational and career goals.

During the 2023 legislative session, the Legislature passed Engrossed 2nd Substitute Bill (E2SSB) 5243, which made several changes to the requirements for HSBP implementation and called for OSPI to begin leading work that would ultimately result in the adoption of a statewide universal platform. Additional details about what has change with this bill, opportunities for engaging in the process and providing feedback, and additional detailed information can be found on OSPI's HSBP webpage.

Projected Timeline:



Ensuring College & Career Readiness via a Comprehensive School Counseling Program (CSCP)

All students need access to personalized career and college exploration opportunities to assist them with seeing connections between their learning and future aspirations, including further education or training and/or career preparation via community and technical colleges or universities, apprenticeships, industry certification programs, and military or on-the-job training.

During the 2021 legislative session, the Legislature passed Substitute Senate Bill (SSB) 5030, which mandates the development of a comprehensive school counseling program (CSCP) plan in alignment with elements of current best practices. SSB 5030 requires districts to implement a CSCP for all schools within the district that includes, among other areas of support, a focus on college and career development as evident in the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) National Model. Go to the OSPI's Comprehensive School Counseling Program webpage for resources to assist in the understanding and development of these required CSCPs.

From SSB 5030, as detailed in RCW 28A.320.600, Washington school districts must develop a CSCP Plan that:

- Establishes a comprehensive school counseling <u>program</u> aligned with nationally recognized school counseling frameworks and WA state learning standards, such as social-emotional learning (SEL) and multi-tiered systems of support (MTSS);
- Provides a process for identifying student needs through a multi-level school data review and analysis that includes, at a minimum, use-of-time data, program results data, and data regarding communication with administrators, parents, students, and stakeholders;
- Explains how direct and indirect services will be delivered through the CSCP; and
- Establishes an *annual review and assessment process* for the comprehensive school counseling <u>program</u> that includes building administrators and stakeholders.

Relatively Recent Legislation that Supports Postsecondary Preparation

From HB1599 (2019), Washington's updated graduation requirements include guidance that:

- 1. Districts must adopt an Academic Acceleration policy (see RCW 28A.320.195) by the 2021-22 school year
 - a. Course decisions must be made in alignment with students' High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP)
- 2. Evidence is provided within the HSBP that all students have received information about *state and federal financial aid* programs
- 3. **All** 10th grade students must update their HSBP, using their statewide assessment scores, transcript and other pertinent data or information, to inform junior year course decisions
- 4. Students with Individualized Education Program (IEP) services *must develop a HSBP* that is *aligned with their IEP Transition Plan*, and in a *similar manner and with similar staff* as their general education peers
- 5. All districts must provide access to an electronic platform for the HSBP (see Bulletin 041-20)
- 6. Student must complete a Graduation Pathway that is aligned with their HSBP (see below)

From SB6141, a Financial Aid Advising Day (FAAD) requirement (see RCW 28A.300.815):

- 1. Districts must notify and provide an annual FAAD for seniors and families by Dec. 1
 - a. This date is in statute, but may need to be extended this year to accommodate the later FAFSA release date in December 2023
- 2. The HSBP must inform students about the *Washington College Grant* (former State Need Grant) and other specifics about applying for financial aid (see component #2 in HB1599 section above)
- 3. A WA financial aid calculator and a sample award letter should be demonstrated and provided to families during the annual FAAD

Graduation Requirement Emergency Waiver (GREW) Change for Class of 2024


- 1. Rules adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE) in May 2022 extended the emergency waiver program through the 2023-2024 school year for the class of 2024. Access the SBE's Emergency Waiver Program webpage to explore the **changes to previous rules for the 2023-24 GREW, including**:
 - a. Eligible students may still waive up to <u>1.0</u> "core" credit; however, there will no longer be an option to waive the Graduation Pathway after 8.31.23.
- 2. The High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP) must still be completed according to RCW 28A.230.090 and be aligned with how students demonstrate their postsecondary preparation in order to access a GREW.
- 3. Schools should use the GREW as a *last resort* and only with students for whom a "good faith effort" has been made to support their completion of all graduation requirements.
- 4. Special care should be given to ensuring students are not waiving the courses or a graduation pathway that would ensure their preparation for, and access to, postsecondary education opportunities.

Other Relevant Legislative Updates

HB1536 (2023) - Adds parameters and restrictions for the withholding of diplomas from HB1176 (2020).

- 1. Schools may not withhold transcripts or grades as a means to recoup fees for property damage.
- 2. Diplomas may only be held if willful damages exceed \$1,000 for the earlier of either five years from the date of the student's graduation or until amount owed is less than \$1,000.
- 3. School districts must provide community service options for the students/families who cannot pay monetary damages. Community service must be credited at the applicable local or state minimum wage, whichever is greater. When amount owed is reduced to less than \$1,000, the diploma of the student must be released. The parent or guardian of the student shall be liable for damages as otherwise provided by law.
- 4. If a student's records are requested by the department of social and health services or other agency granted custody of a child, the records may not be withheld for nonpayment of school fees or any other reason.
- 5. Each school district that withholds a diploma must publish and maintain the amount and cohort information on its website for current and five school years and be updated annually.

HB1664 (2021) – Phases in additional funding over the next three years for "physical, social, and emotional supports" in schools. This funding <u>must</u> be used to hire any of the staff positions listed in OSPI's guidance (<u>OSPIs Physical, Social, and Emotional Support (PSES) Q&A, pg. 2</u>).

Career and College Readiness Related OSPI Updates

OSPI's 2021-24 <u>Strategic Goals</u> (#2) include a focus on increasing access to postsecondary options that will prepare our students for their future goals, and specifically continued efforts to increase flexibility with course choices.

- 1. The Superintendent of Public Instruction has approved seven new state Career and Technical Education (CTE) course equivalencies, now available for district adoption. CTE equivalency courses align with core content learning standards to support student course flexibility and choice on their path to obtaining a diploma and preparing for postsecondary education. These state equivalency frameworks were built in collaboration with educators and business and industry partners and are considered best practice for aligning instruction of CTE course content with learning standards for core academic courses.
 - Newly-Approved CTE Course Equivalencies:

- Starting September 2021, any statewide CTE Equivalency courses offered in a district or at a skill center must be offered for <u>academic</u> credit and transcribed as the academic course. This can help students meet their credit and graduation pathway requirements while meeting college admissions standards.
 - Passed in 2023, <u>SB5617</u> also now directs any districts using a skill center to accept the host district's CTE equivalencies and corresponding academic credit for any skill center courses
- ❖ Districts with 2000 or more students must provide access to at least one statewide CTE equivalency.

- 2. <u>Seal of Biliteracy</u>: the requirement for students to have met standard on the SBA in ELA was removed so now students can be considered as having met the ELA standard by meeting any of the Graduation Pathway options!
 - There is also work happening to broaden the number of languages in which students can demonstrate their proficiency, and increase access to exams in rural areas, thus providing a broader group of students with more opportunities to meet their World Language requirement for four-year college admissions.

Graduation Pathways available to the Class of 2024:

- Career/Technical Field = CTE Course Sequence
- Military Career Interest = ASVAB Exam (AFQT Section only)
- Postsecondary Education = English Language Arts (ELA) and Math Courses and Exams (Can use any combination of the ELA and math options.)
- Performance-Based = NEW! Graduation Pathway (HB1308)
 - The State Board of Education will be developing rules to implement this new graduation pathway option, with final rules likely to be available by early 2024
 - Additional information about this new pathway option is posted on the State Board of Education Performance-Based Pathway Webpage.

What's New in 2023-24

Bridge Grant

For the academic year 2023-24, students who are receiving the maximum Washington College Grant may be eligible to receive an additional \$500 Bridge Grant. The Bridge Grant is to assist with costs associated with higher education. The Bridge Grant is not available to students that are eligible for the College Bound Scholarship and the award is limited to the student's need.

2024-25 FAFSA / WASFA Release Date Change

On December 27, 2020, Congress passed the FAFSA Simplification Act. This act will offer a major redesign of the processes and systems used to award financial aid starting with the 2024-2025 award year. This redesign will delay the release of the 2024-2025 FAFSA and WASFA to December 2023. Aim Higher Washington will be providing trainings to support you through these changes. WA Grant Campaign

A Washington College Grant (WA Grant) campaign has been implemented to increase awareness of the WA Grant program. This is a multi-faceted campaign to encourage students, apprentices, and families to apply. WA Grant gives more money to more people for more kinds of education and training beyond high school.

Washington Award for Vocational Excellence

The Washington Award for Vocational Excellence (WAVE) was established by the Legislature in 1984 to help emphasize the importance of career and technical education, and the value of real-world, hands-on learning. The award was suspended in 2010 because of budget cutbacks during the Great Recession and restarted by the Legislature in 2022. The award recognizes high-performing career and technical education (CTE) students at the high school and college levels.

Award values are based on the total number of scholarships awarded, as funding is limited, but can cover up to two years of tuition, according to the tuition charged by the institution students will attend. WAVE is administered by the Workforce Board in collaboration with WSAC, which handles the disbursement of funds. College Bound - GPA Requirement

Beginning in the 2023-24 academic year, there is no high school GPA requirement to receive College Bound at a community college or technical school. Students who enroll directly after high school into a four-year college or university will still need to meet the 2.0 GPA requirement to receive College Bound. Students with a high school GPA below 2.0 who attend a community college or technical school initially and then transfer to a four-year college will be able to receive College Bound. All students must still meet other College Bound Pledge and program requirements to receive funds. Students must still meet admission requirements to the four-year college or university of their choice and enroll before receiving College Bound.

Residency

Beginning in 2022, it is easier for undocumented students and others to meet residency requirements for in-state tuition and state aid. To qualify, students must:

- Earn a high school diploma, GED, or diploma equivalent from anywhere in the United States before their first term.
- Live in Washington for at least 12 consecutive months immediately before their first term for purposes other than college.
- Sign an affidavit saying they meet the above requirements. Students who are not a US citizen, national, or permanent resident will also commit to applying for U.S. permanent residency when eligible.

Students who complete the WASFA will be considered for state financial aid programs only. The WASFA is available in English and Spanish.

GEAR UP

Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) is a federally funded program that provides high-poverty school districts with resources to support them in preparing students for postsecondary options. WSAC, Washington State University, and University of Washington lead GEAR UP programs serving over 37,000 students in 70 school districts. The WSAC-led program serves over 5,500 students in 26 school districts. WSAC maintains a website of free resources available to schools, students, and families, including family newsletter templates, college visit resources, a



scholarship listing, and more. There is also a page focused on COVID-related updates and resources.

12th Year Campaign

The 12th Year Campaign provides free trainings, materials, and other resources to those working with students on admissions and financial aid applications. College Savings Plans-WA529

Washington's two 529 college savings plans are the Guaranteed Education Tuition (GET) Program and the DreamAhead College Investment Plan. They help families save for future college and career training expenses.

GET and DreamAhead accounts grow tax-deferred and remain tax-free when used for qualified education expenses—tuition, fees, room & board, books, supplies, and more. Students can use GET and DreamAhead funds at public or private four-year colleges or universities in the U.S. and even some schools abroad, as well as trade schools and registered apprenticeship programs.

GET

GET is a 529 prepaid tuition plan that offers Washington residents a "peace of mind" way to save for higher education. The State guarantees that savings in a GET account will keep pace with changes in-state public tuition rates. Specifically, 100 GET units purchased today will always equal one year of tuition and state-mandated fees at Washington's highest priced public university, no matter how much it changes in the future. The GET open enrollment period runs November through May each year.



DreamAhead

DreamAhead is a 529 college investment plan open to anyone in the United States. Account owners select savings options and their money is invested in the market. DreamAhead investors can customize their saving portfolios based on their risk tolerance and student age. DreamAhead enrollment is open year-round.

TheWashBoard.org is committed to increasing access to scholarships and financial aid for Washington students. Launched in 2010, theWashBoard.org, a free, scholarship matching website for Washington students, is a simple and central scholarship search and application resource. Last year, nearly \$18.3 million in scholarships were offered with a minimum of 3,741 available awards on TheWashBoard.org.



Need-based financial aid programs

College Bound

collegebound.wa.gov

College Bound is an early commitment of state financial aid to cover tuition at public rates, some fees, and a small book allowance at over 65 eligible Washington postsecondary institutions.

This commitment is mostly fulfilled by the Washington College Grant. The application is a two-step process. After being auto-enrolled in 7th, 8th, or in some cases, 9th grade, high school students must fulfill program pledge requirements and meet residency and income requirements. Students must enroll in college within one year of high school graduation and four academic years' worth of funds to be used within five years of high school graduation.



Passport to Careers Program

This program offers two pathways for foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth seeking a postsecondary degree or career training.

The Passport to College program helps students successfully attend a postsecondary institution by providing a college scholarship and comprehensive support.

The Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program helps students with career-related training under state-approved apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs. Support services and financial aid are provided through ANEW.



Washington College Grant

The Washington College Grant (WA Grant) provides need-based financial aid to Washington students pursuing postsecondary education and access to funding for registered and approved apprenticeship programs. Students who meet eligibility requirements¹ can use the financial aid at Washington's eligible institutions², including public two- and four-year colleges and universities, and many accredited private/independent colleges, universities, and career schools in the state. In addition, participants may receive WA Grant funding for approved apprenticeship programs available through approved apprenticeship program providers.



In 2022-23, the eligibility thresholds have increased and funds are guaranteed to all eligible students and apprenticeship participants, making the WA Grant one of the most generous financial aid programs in the country.

State Work Study

State Work Study is financial aid for low- and middle-income students. Qualifying students get an approved on- or off-campus job to support their education. Work study builds students' skills, increases their earnings, and reduces reliance on student loans. The state contributes to the wages of work study employees, so participating employers benefit from educated and motivated workers at a lower cost. Many employers hire work study students on a permanent basis after graduation.

Merit-based financial aid programs

American Indian Endowed Scholarship

The American Indian Endowed Scholarship program provides educational scholarships on a competitive basis to high-achieving resident students, with demonstrated financial need, who have close social and cultural ties to an American Indian tribe or community within the state. Recipients demonstrate academic merit and a commitment to serve the American Indian communities in Washington.

Workforce programs

Educator Workforce Programs

The Washington State Educator Workforce Program provides financial aid to attract and retain teachers to work in subjects or locations of high need known as shortage areas. The program includes options for current teachers, student teachers, paraprofessionals, and non-educators hoping to move into the teaching field. The conditional scholarships require the participant to fulfill teaching service in a Washington K-12 public common school in exchange for the scholarship funds. The grant is awarded to applicants with the most financial need who are student teaching in a Washington K-12 Title I public common school.

National Guard Postsecondary Education Grant

The National Guard Postsecondary Education Grant, commonly known as the National Guard Grant, helps eligible, actively participating members of the Washington National Guard with the costs of higher education through a conditional scholarship. Participants commit to serving one year in the Washington National Guard in exchange for each year of grant funding. Combined with state and federal aid, grants can be used for costs of attendance, such as tuition, fees, room, and board, at approved colleges in Washington, as well as a portion of books and materials.

Dual Credit

WA Grant Maximum Usage Standard & Dual Credit

The Washington College Grant (WA Grant) has a maximum usage standard of 15 quarters/10 semesters or equivalent. The timeframe only applies to the quarters in which a student received the WA Grant. Because dual credit students cannot receive state financial aid to pay for college credits earned through dual credit, no course work taken in dual credit programs will apply to the WA Grant maximum usage timeframe³. Additionally, students who earn an associate degree through dual credit programs can use WA Grant toward another associate degree, if they are enrolled in an aideligible program.

Maximum usage timeframes differ for state, federal, and institutional financial aid. Dual credit participation may still affect a student's access to financial aid, depending on the type of aid. Students who get close to the maximum timeframe will need to work closely with the financial aid representative at their college/university to maintain eligibility for federal and institutional aid. This issue is most likely to occur for students who graduate high school with a high number of college credits. Colleges and universities also typically include credits earned in dual-credit programs to evaluate satisfactory academic progress (SAP) when determining financial aid eligibility.

³ Once a student completes their BA/BS, they are no longer eligible to receive the WA Grant, even if they had not utilized the fulltime limits. College credits earned through dual credit programs may be applied to BA/BS degrees.

College Admissions and Transfers

Transfers

Washington's public community and technical colleges offer transfer associate degrees that make it easier for students to transfer to bachelor's programs in Washington. These degrees transfer to all public and most private four-year colleges and universities.

There are three different transfer associate degrees:

- Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) Associate Degree: Meets most lower division general education requirements at four-year colleges and universities.
- Associate of Science Transfer (AS-T) Degree: For students who want to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering
 or science.
- Major Related Programs (MRPs): DTA and AS-T plans that prepare students for bachelor's degrees in specific majors such as business, nursing, and computer science.

Once admitted to a participating bachelor's degree program, students who complete transfer degrees can generally expect 90 transferrable quarter credits and junior class standing.

College Admissions

Washington colleges have different admission policies, and some are more selective than others. Public community and technical colleges have an open-admission policy. WSAC works with partners in K-12 and higher education to set minimum admission standards for the state's public baccalaureate schools.

High schools can choose to participate in a <u>Guaranteed Admissions Program (GAP) - Council of Presidents, a partnership</u> with 5 public baccalaureate schools. (councilofpresidents.org/ admissions/guaranteed-admissions-program-gap/)

Dual Credit Options

Running Start

Running Start allows 11th and 12th grade students to take college courses at Washington's 34 community and technical colleges. Students earn high school and college credits for these courses. Running Start students and their families do not pay tuition for up to a combined college and high school annual FTE of 1.4. Students pay mandatory fees, books, and transportation. Some colleges have grants and waivers to help students with these expenses. Check with the college for details.

Students interested in Running Start may get more information from their high school counseling office or from the Running Start coordinator at their local college. Many colleges offer orientation sessions to help students and families learn more about the program. The entire catalog of courses is available to Running Start students. This includes electives, vocational, online, and advanced course work.

College in the High School

College in the High School programs provide collegelevel academic courses to 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade students. Courses are taught at the high school by high school teachers with college curriculum, college textbooks, and oversight by college faculty and staff.

- Beginning fall 2023, all course fees have been removed. All students can participate in these courses at no cost.
- Located at the high school.

CTE Dual Credit

CTE Dual Credit allows high school students to earn college credit in their high school career and technical education (CTE) classes without leaving their high school campus.

- Tuition free.
- Located at the high school.
- Credits apply only to <u>professional-technical</u> certificates or degrees.

University and College Transfer

More and more students get started on a bachelor's degree with an associate transfer degree. Students get a high-quality undergraduate experience and save money by starting at a community or technical college and transferring to a Washington four-year college, branch campus, university center, or applied baccalaureate program.

Associate transfer degrees

Several options are available, so students should work closely with an advisor to choose the right degree and classes for their educational and career goals. Students should contact the four-year college or university of their choice to fully understand and meet degree requirements before transferring.

- Earn a high school diploma from the college through one of the following high school completion programs (may require financial aid)

I-BEST

Washington's nationally renowned Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training program (I-BEST) uses a team-teaching approach to combine adult education classes with regular, credit-bearing academic or job training classes so students get through school and into jobs faster.

Project I-DEA

With I-DEA, English language learners who face the largest language gaps are learning English quickly and in practical ways.

Like I-BEST, this project uses an integrated, teamteaching approach so students learn English in tandem with job skills and life skills. Classes are "flipped": Students learn basic words and ideas online and cement their knowledge in class with the aid of instructors and peers. Computers and 24-hour internet access allow students to learn topics that matter most to them, anytime, anywhere.

<u>Competency-based education</u>

Many adult education courses are competency-based; students move through adult education into pre-college (remedial) or college-level courses based on knowledge gained rather than time spent in a classroom. Students move as quickly through courses as their competencies take them.

High School Equivalency (HSE)

Many people who did not finish high school have the same knowledge and skills as those who did graduate. By taking and passing a series of HSE tests, adults can demonstrate they have acquired the same level of knowledge. Washington state uses the four-part GED* tests for its HSE test.

Most colleges and employers accept an HSE credential as being equivalent to a high school diploma. SBCTC oversees the HSE testing program for the State of Washington. Those who meet the eligibility requirements may take the HSE tests at official test centers located throughout the state. You can find a local test center through the GED® Testing Service.

High School+

High School+ is a competency-based high school diploma offered at Washington's community and technical colleges for adults who are at least 18 years old. Advisors look at transcripts and knowledge gained from life experience, and work with students to craft an educational plan to fill gaps. To receive a diploma, students must demonstrate competency in reading, writing, and math in the context of science, history, government, occupational studies, and digital literacy.

Sports and Recreation

Community colleges provide a variety of enrichment activities and programs, including intercollegiate athletics. Sports include basketball, baseball, cross country, golf, softball, soccer, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling. Recognizing the time commitment of student-athletes, colleges may fund tuition Grants-in-Aid through scholarships of up to 40 percent of tuition costs. Multicultural/Diversity and Student Leadership

The multicultural/diversity and student leadership offices on our college campuses work to create an environment that welcomes everyone, encourages civic engagement and student involvement, and provides opportunities for student success. They offer events, programs, and spaces that promote understanding, celebrate diversity, and honor different points of view. Their commitment to diversity, social justice, and multiculturalism has earned prestigious awards across the state.

Disability Student Services

Campus disability support service offices ensure equal access to educational programs and services by providing consultation on accommodations (e.g. placement testing, classroom, assistive technology) for students with disabilities who are otherwise qualified for college.

The rights of students with disabilities are different in college from what they were in high school. It is important for high school students and their parents to plan appropriately for their students' transitions to post-secondary institutions. Compared to services at public schools, the services provided by post-secondary institutions may seem minimal.

To be eligible for disability-related services, students must have a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Under the ADA and Section 504, a person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities (walking, standing, seeing, speaking, hearing, sitting, breathing, and taking care of oneself).

Financial Aid

Community and technical colleges award federal, state, college-based grants, and work-study based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA).

Financial aid deadlines vary. Check with the college of your choice for priority dates. We encourage students to apply early.

Colleges widely recommend students planning to attend fall quarter adhere to the timeline set for College Bound students (February 1).

Those planning to attend winter or spring quarter should also apply for aid by spring of the previous year.

Scholarships

A variety of scholarships may be available from each college based on financial need, program of study or major, academic merit, leadership or community service. Many colleges offer scholarships through their foundations or list scholarships at their websites.

Most deadlines for fall scholarships for graduating high school seniors offered by community and technical college foundations will be in February, March and April of that year.

Tuition Waivers

Certain populations are eligible for full or partial reduction of tuition. Tuition waivers vary by campus, so check with college registration offices.

Some examples: Military veterans, senior citizens, active-duty military/Washington National Guard, children of deceased or disabled law enforcement officers and firefighters, families of fallen soldiers and families of disabled veterans, basic education.



Student Life, Recreation, Resources

The Activities and Recreation Center (ARC) at Cascadia College and UW Bothell offers a fitness center, food trucks, a game room, meeting and event spaces, and student resources.

The **Kodiak Cave** is an emergency food resource center located on campus that directly serves the student body of Cascadia College. Kodiak Cave's mission is to end hunger on our campus by providing nourishing meals, education and resources to our community. It currently operates as a "choice pantry", meaning guests will be able to pick the food from the cross-cultural items that best meets their needs. This gives guests dignity as well as comfort because they can choose from items that they are familiar with. It also helps to reduce food waste. Kodiak Cave offers curbside pick-up and weekly deliveries as well virtual cooking classes for students to help educate them on nutrition, further reducing waste, and saving money.

The Cascadia Scholars Program was implemented to help BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, Persons of Color) and historically marginalized students connect to the college and achieve their educational and career goals. The program offers mentoring, resources, and support for students. Cascadia works with local school districts to provide students of color/justice conferences each spring. The conference themes include identity, collaboration, education, leadership, and social justice.

New Degrees & Programs

Cascadia College is one of two current colleges in partnership with University of Washington to offer new American Indian and Indigenous Studies (AIIS) courses that directly transfer into UW's AIIS degree program. These courses celebrate the contemporary lives and historical local experiences of PNW Indigenous peoples. Through these courses, Cascadia will be centralizing the indigenous experience within its own community culture, as well as collaborating with tribal groups to help meet their academic and workforce needs.

Cascadia's Networking Infrastructure Technology (NIT) pathway is part of the Cloud Computing Career Launch Program which is a partnership with Amazon's AWS Educate and Washington's technology employers. The program is integrating industry recognized cloud computing curriculum such as security, architecture, and database platforms. By adapting our program (course modifications have started in Fall 2021) with cloud skills, students will obtain the latest job skill and

career paths to cloud computing, and provide internship opportunities with industry partners.

New in summer 2023, the Associate in Applied Science-Transfer (AAS-T) degree in **Office Supervision and Management** emphasizes advanced office technology, administration, business, and management courses for the person who wants to move into a supervisory, managerial, or executive assistant position.

Employment opportunities for graduates may include administrative assistant, executive assistant, executive secretary, office manager, and administrative supervisor. The program and degree is designed for a direct transfer to the Bachelor of Applied Science in Information Technology and Administrative Management at Central Washington University (CWU).

New Buildings

Innovation Hall opens for classes winter quarter 2024. This is the first academic building shared jointly by Cascadia and UW Bothell. The goal of this state-of-theart facility is to open STEM fields students who have historically been underrepresented in STEM education. It also represents a physical manifestation of new academic agreements designed to facilitate the seamless transition for Cascadia students who choose to continue their STEM studies at UW Bothell.

Cascadia College is proud to open a classroom in the Redmond Together Center (RTC), an innovative project that houses a wide range of social services and low-income housing in one complex. Cascadia will begin teaching courses in fall quarter 2023. Course programming will be geared towards the needs of RTC residents, clients of the organizations located in the complex, and students for whom it is difficult to commute to our campus. This is one example of how Cascadia is centering equity and inclusion.



Gonzaga University does not require an SAT or ACT. Students applying without a test have the same access to everything: admission, automatic merit scholarships, special scholarships, Honors, and direct admission to nursing. No additional information is required.




