State Board of Education – GREW

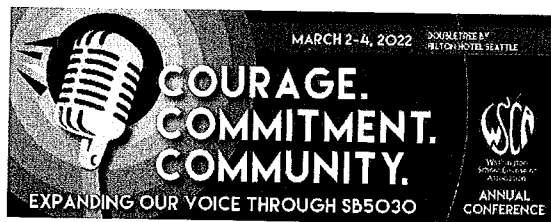
- Pros
 - Seniors not penalized for pandemic & able to graduate on time
 - High schools' graduation rates didn't take a hit
- Cons
 - Students not motivated to pass classes
 - Unknown long-term – what did this teach our students?
- Unknown long-term impact on students – college (more gap years), careers, life choices

2021 Legislation passed:

- HB 1373, Behavioral Health/Students, promoting student access to information about behavioral health services
- HB 1363, Secondary Trauma, Addresses secondary trauma in the K-12 workforce
- SSB 5030, the 80/20 bill, Developing Comprehensive School Counseling Programs – Fall of 2022-2023
 - Your association leadership:

 - encourages you to become involved at the school, district, regional, state level(s)

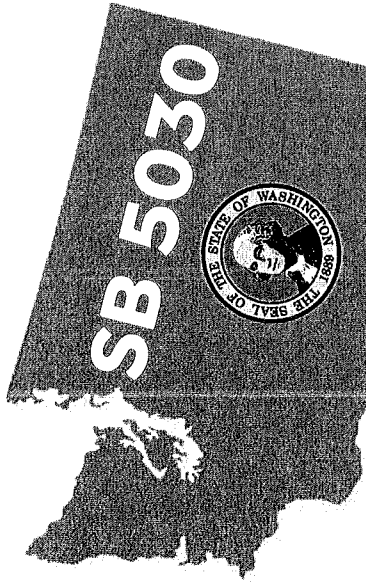

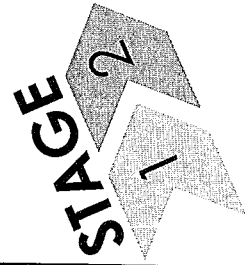

What will be required as a result of SB 5030?

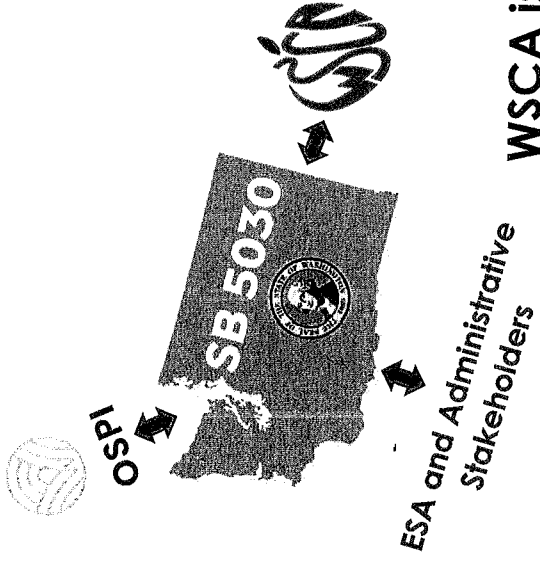


The two stages of SB 5030: In 2021-22, every school district will write the plan (stage 1) and begin implementation in 2022-23 (stage 2) with full implementation coming in subsequent years.

The written plan must include the following:

- ✓ a comprehensive school counseling program (CSCP) that uses state and nationally recognized counselor frameworks (ASCA) that are aligned with state learning standards.
- ✓ a process for identifying student needs through a multi-level school data review and analysis
- ✓ an explanation of how direct and indirect services will be delivered through the CSCP (80/20 language)
- ✓ a plan to establish an annual review and assessment process for the CSCP that includes building administrators and stakeholders

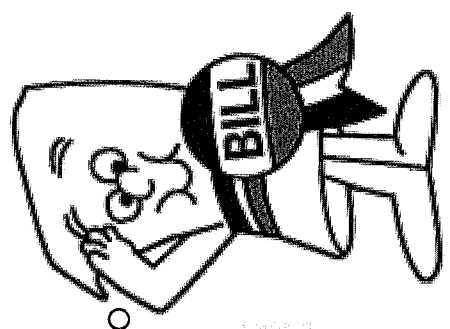
The CSCP must be implemented by school counselors OR other ESA's (social workers, psychologists, nurses, OT's) who must spend at least 80% of their contracted work time providing direct and indirect services to students.



OSPI is collaborating with WSCA (Washington School Counselor Association) and other ESA and Administrative stakeholders to develop guidance for school districts that includes resources to support the development of a written plan and implementation of a CSCP. OSPI staff are working to publish guidance by mid-October.

WSCA is collaborating with OSPI to provide support for the implementation of SB 5030 which includes:

- ✓ training models for counselors and stakeholders such as building and district administration, school boards etc.
- ✓ collaborating with AWSP, WASA and WSSDA as well as Hatching Results to deliver keynotes, pre-conference and regular conference sessions centered around the elements of SB 5030 at the annual WSCA spring conference
- ✓ systems of support for our WSCA membership on how to prepare for this transition.

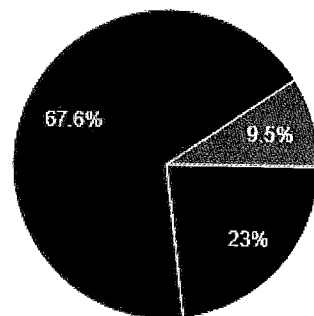

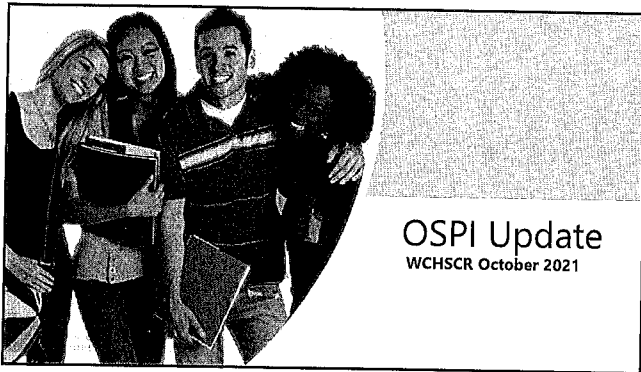

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GOAL 2 Rigorous Learner-Centered Options in Every Community

OSPI will continue to work with the state and local education agencies to ensure that all students have access to rigorous, learner-centered options in every community.

• Increase the number of high-quality, rigorous learning options in every community.

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- Selected Colleges
 - South Puget Sound Community College
 - Yakima Valley College
 - Skagit Valley College
 - 137 enrolled
 - 117 (85.4%) passed
 - 134 (97.8%) in transfer courses
 - 120 (87.6%) came back in fall
 - 45 (32.8%) 1st time enrolled
 - 40 (29.2%) qualified for FRPL
 - 63 (46%) 1st Gen
 - 55 (40.1%) Male
- Outcome data might be used to push for 2nd year of funding...?

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- Consolidates CHS Subsidy and Dual Credit Equity and Sustainability Grant
- Schools can now pay college at beginning of quarter
- Serves 9-12 grade
- Still prioritizes small and rural schools and 2019-20 grant recipients
- Applications = 119
 - CHS only = 44

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SB5030

- OSPIs Bulletin/guidance should be out by Nov. 5th
- Implementation will begin in 2022-23

Other Leg/Budget Priorities

- Additional 0.5FTE for high poverty schools to increase school counseling (specifically for ESAs/nurses)
- Modern Algebra II
- \$ for STEM learning spaces
- Close digital divide
- Increase capacity to support navigating Special Education system


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FAFSA/WASFA Completion



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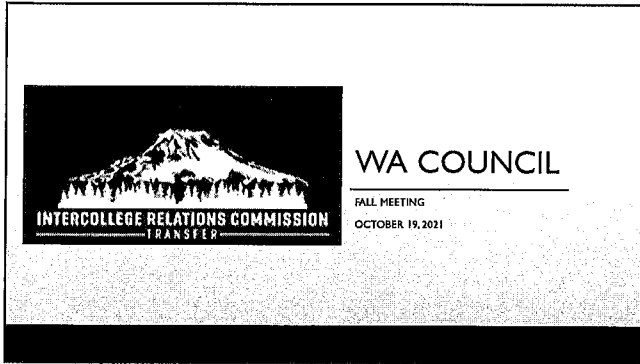

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ICRC HAPPY 50TH

- The first meeting of the Intercollege Relations Commission (ICRC) was held on December 10, 1970, at Bellevue Community College.
- During the first year and a half, the Commission met several times each quarter to develop guidelines for Associate degree agreements. The first set of guidelines was adopted in 1971. The Commission also developed a constitution, sponsored transfer advisor workshops, examined the College Level Examination Program, focused on problems related to transfer of credit, established an institutional hotline, and gathered data on a variety of topics.
