

#### **Access and Opportunities**

Washington's public, four-year college and universities are committed to meeting the college and career goals of all Washington students. Together we offer a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality degree completion. Excellence is exemplified in the accomplishments of our students, staff and faculty through quality academic instruction, innovation in research, strong student services and commitment to public service.

#### Earn a Baccalaureate Degree or Higher

Our sector is the largest provider of bachelor's and graduate degrees in Washington, offering a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality baccalaureate, graduate, and professional degree completion. In 2019-20, graduates from the public baccalaureate sector made up three out of four (75%) of bachelor's degree earners in the state <sup>1</sup>.

#### Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics and High Demand

The public baccalaureate sector is committed to serving the science, technology, engineering and mathematics education goals of Washingtonians and high demand areas of the state's economy. The most recent data shows Washington's public baccalaureate institutions awarded nearly 40% of all undergraduate degrees in STEM fields.

#### **Liberal Arts**

The liberal arts represent multiple fields, including humanities, social sciences, mathematics, and natural sciences – including STEM fields. The most recent data show our campuses awarded over 60% of all undergraduate degrees in non-STEM fields.

#### **High Impact Programs**

A range of high impact programs are available to students. International programs allow students to integrate learning with a new cultural context. Internships provide students with the opportunity to apply their knowledge and learning in the workplace. Undergraduate research offers students direct engagement in applied and academic research initiatives to shape their academic experience.

#### Online Learning

Online learning continues to be a growing educational option that enables Washingtonians to earn college credit from anywhere in the state through multiple approaches. While these programs are increasingly part of students' academic experiences, they offer opportunities especially for place-bound students and working adults.

#### Pre-College Opportunities for High School Students

Our institutions collaborate and provide pre-college programs and opportunities for high school students. These opportunities provide orientation, experience, and preparation for college and offer the option to earn college credit while in high school.

#### Two- to Four-Year Transfer Opportunities

We are national leaders in the completion of bachelor's degrees for transfer students. Together, the sector ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> in the nation for the percentage of transfer students who begin at a community or technical college and earn a bachelor's degree.

#### Admissions

We are excited to welcome Washington students to any one of our institutions. We want Washington high school students! Our students represent the diverse demographics of today's society. Washington high school students are <u>our</u> students. We pledge to serve all students, now and in the future, with a commitment to identifying and reducing equity and opportunity gaps.

Each <u>admissions review process</u> considers the whole student. This means institutions engage in a 360-degree review, considering grades, courses – both the type and the level at which taken – as well as outside activities and community engagement, when making admissions decisions.

All Washington public, four-year college and universities continue alternative standardized test policies regarding admissions exams first adopted in fall 2021. Students will not be disadvantaged during the admission process nor will student eligibility for institutionally supported scholarships, course placement or admissions to Honors programs be impacted by the absence of SAT or ACT standardized test scores.

#### **Washington Public Four-Year College and University Facts**

- A Critical Role. Offering a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality degree completion, our colleges and universities play a critical role in the state's economy, as well as Washington's social and civic culture. In 2019-20, the institutions served over 142,105 students and awarded over 35,000 undergraduate and graduate degrees<sup>2</sup>.
- An Affordable Option. In 2019-20, Washington public four-year institutions ranked in the top 10 for low average undergraduate tuition and fees among all states<sup>3</sup>. In Washington the costs are <u>lower</u> than national trends, with in-state tuition averaging only \$7,168 for public four years, and \$4,468 for community and technical colleges. And net costs to students are often lower once federal, state, and institutional aid are factored. Nearly one third of undergraduate students enrolled received a Pell Grant or Washington College Grant. Fifty-three percent (53%) of the Class of 2020 graduated from a Washington baccalaureate degree-granting institution with no student loan debt<sup>4</sup>.
- Serving an Increasingly Diverse Student Population. Over half (52%) of undergraduate students in 2019-20 identified as students of color. Fourteen percent of students were 25 years old or older. Nearly one third of students received the Pell or Washington College Grant.
- Strong Commitment to Degree Completion. As of 2019, Washington's public, four-year college and universities ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> in graduation rates for the West region of the United States. In the same academic year, the average length of time to complete a bachelor's degree for students who enrolled in a Washington public baccalaureate institution directly from high school was 4.02 years.
- Value Added. Bachelor's degree completion continues to be <u>associated</u>, in Washington and nationally, with increased lifetime earnings, lower unemployment rates, lower incidences of poverty, better health outcomes, longer life expectancy and higher rates of civic and social engagement.
- Dynamic Education for Current and Future Careers. These campuses continue to actively engage in the
  development and review of education pathways and credentials that lead to degrees and outcomes to respond
  effectively to the changing demands of the current and future workplace.
- Our Role in Workforce and Economic Development. Demand for workers with postsecondary credentials is higher than it has ever been. Our campuses are directly engaged with businesses and employers. As a sector, we partner with businesses and employers to identify knowledge and skills offered in our degree programs that are necessary to meet the economic needs of the state.

#### **Ensuring College & Career Readiness via a Comprehensive School Counseling Program (CSCP)**

All students need access to personalized career and college exploration opportunities to assist them with seeing connections between their learning and future aspirations, including further education or training and/or career preparation via community and technical colleges or universities, apprenticeships, industry certification programs, and military or on-the-job training.

During the 2021 legislative session, the Legislature passed Substitute Senate Bill (SSB) 5030, which clarifies the role of the school counselor in alignment with current best practices. SSB 5030 requires districts to develop and implement a comprehensive school counseling program (CSCP) for all schools within the district that includes, among other areas of support, a focus on college and career development in alignment with the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) National Model. Go to the OSPI's Comprehensive School Counseling Program webpage for resources to assist in the understanding and development of CSCPs.

#### From SSB 5030, as detailed in RCW 28A.320.600, Washington school districts must develop a CSCP Plan that:

- Establishes a comprehensive school counseling program that uses state and nationally recognized counselor *frameworks* and is systemically aligned to state learning *standards*;
- Provides a process for identifying *student needs* through a multilevel *school data review and analysis* that includes, at a minimum, use-of-time data, program results data, and data regarding communication with administrators, parents, students, and stakeholders;
- Explains how direct and indirect services will be delivered through the comprehensive school counseling program; and
- Establishes an *annual review and assessment process* for the comprehensive school counseling program that includes building administrators and stakeholders.

#### **Recent Legislation that Supports Postsecondary Preparation**

#### From HB1599, Washington's updated graduation requirements include guidance that:

- Districts must adopt an Academic Acceleration policy by the 2021-22 school year
  - course decisions must be made in alignment with their HSBP (see RCW 28A.320.195)
- Evidence is provided that all students receive information about state and federal financial aid programs
- > **All** 10th grade students must update their HSBP, using their statewide assessment scores, transcript and other pertinent data or information to *inform junior year course decisions*
- > Students with Individualized Education Program (IEP) services *must develop a HSBP* aligned with their IEP Transition Plan, and in a similar manner and with similar staff as their gen. ed. peers
- ➤ All districts must provide access to an *electronic platform* for the HSBP (see <u>Bulletin 041-20</u>)
- > Student must complete a *Graduation Pathway* that is aligned with their HSBP (see below)

#### From SB6141, a Financial Aid Advising Day (FAAD) requirement (see RCW 28A.300.815):


- Districts must notify and provide an annual FAAD for seniors and families by Dec. 1
- The HSBP must inform students about the **Washington College Grant** (former State Need Grant) and other specifics about applying for financial aid
- A new WA financial aid calculator should be demonstrated to families during the FAAD

#### **Graduation Requirement Emergency Waiver (GREW) Extension**

- ➤ Rules adopted by the State Board of Education (SBE) in May 2022 extend the emergency waiver program through the 2022-2023 school year for the class of 2023. Access the SBE's <a href="Emergency Waiver Program webpage">Emergency Waiver Program webpage</a> to ensure understanding of their final rules for the 2022-23 GREW.
  - The GREW still allows eligible students to waive the graduation pathway requirement and up to 2.0 "core" credits.
  - o The High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP) must still be completed according to <u>RCW 28A.230.090</u> and be aligned with how students demonstrate their postsecondary preparation in order to access a GREW.
  - Schools should use the GREW as a *last resort* and only with students for whom a "good faith effort" has been made to support their completion of all graduation requirements.
  - Special care should be given to ensuring students are not waiving the courses or a graduation pathway that would ensure their preparation for, and access to, postsecondary education opportunities.

#### **Other Relevant Legislative Updates**

HB1664 (2021) – Phases in additional funding over the next three years for physical, social, and emotional supports in schools. This funding must be used to increase access to nurses, psychologists, school counselors, and social workers.

learning standards to support student course flexibility and choice on their path to obtaining a diploma and preparing for postsecondary education. These state equivalency frameworks were built in collaboration with educators and business and industry partners and are considered best practice for aligning instruction of CTE course content with learning standards for core academic courses.

- Starting September 2021, any statewide CTE Equivalency courses offered in a district or at a skill center must be offered for academic credit. This can help students meet their credit and graduation pathway requirements while also meeting college admissions standards.
- Districts with 2000 or more students must provide access to at least one statewide CTE equivalency course.
- > Seal of Biliteracy: the requirement for students to have met standard on the SBA in ELA was removed so now students can be considered as having met the ELA standard by meeting any of the Graduation Pathway options!
  - There is also work happening to broaden the number of languages in which students can demonstrate
    their proficiency, and increase access to exams in rural areas, thus providing a broader group of students
    with more opportunities to meet their World Language requirement for four-year college admissions.

#### **Graduation Pathways available to the Class of 2023:**

#### <u>Career/Technical Field = CTE Course Sequence</u>

- Complete a sequence of 2.0 or more total credits that either includes a dual credit course or leads to an industry recognized credential (IRC)
  - students do not have to actually *earn* college credit or an IRC while in high school
- Complete a Core Plus program

#### Military Career Interest = ASVAB Exam (AFQT Section only)

- Score for Class of 2023 = 31
  - Check the State Board of Education website by September 1 for annually updated score

#### Postsecondary Education = English Language Arts (ELA) and Math Courses and Exams

(Can use any combination of the ELA and math options listed in this section.)

- ACT (ELA = 14; math = 16) or SAT (ELA = 410; math = 430)
  - The SAT's ELA score remains the same with writing; the essay is no longer required
- Dual credit courses (1.0 credit total for ELA and/or math):

#### **About the Washington Student Achievement Council**

The Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) is a nine-member council supported by a cabinet-level state agency. The Council's mission is to advance educational opportunities and attainment in Washington. In pursuit of that mission, the Council:

- Leads statewide strategic planning to improve educational coordination and transitions.
- Supports Washingtonians through the administration of financial aid, two college savings plans, and support services.
- Advocates for the economic, social, and civic benefits of postsecondary education.

#### What's New in 2022-2023

#### **Bridge Grant**

For the academic year 2022-2023, students who are receiving the maximum Washington College Grant may be eligible to receive an additional \$500 Bridge Grant. The Bridge Grant is to assist with costs associated with higher education. The Bridge Grant is not available to students that are eligible for the College Bound Scholarship and the award is limited to the student's need.

#### **Washington College Grant Campaign**

There will be a campaign implemented to increase awareness of the Washington College Grant program. This is expected to be a multi-faceted campaign to encourage students, apprentices, and families to apply. Washington College Grant gives more money to more people for more kinds of education and training beyond high school.

#### **Washington Award for Vocational Excellence**

The Washington Award for Vocational Excellence (WAVE) relaunched after a 10-year hiatus due to budget cutbacks during the Great Recession. The award recognizes high-performing career and technical education (CTE) students at both the high school and college level, covering up to two years of tuition, according to the tuition charged by the institution students will attend—up to \$11,000 per year. WAVE is administered by the Workforce Board in collaboration with the Washington Student Achievement Council, which handles the disbursement of funds. #### College Bound Scholarship - Auto-enrollment

Effective retroactively to the 2019-20 academic year, all public school free-and-reduced-price lunch eligible 7th, 8th and newly eligible 9th graders will be auto-enrolled in the College Bound Scholarship. WSAC will work with OSPI to auto-enroll eligible students. Schools and their districts should provide contact information for eligible students via the WSAC portal and help notify students of this opportunity in partnership with WSAC.

#### **Student Loan Education Course**

The Student Loan Education Course provides a series of learning modules with information on applying for aid, comparing award letters, knowing how much aid a student needs, and repayment topics with four tracks:

- Preparing for school
- Understanding my loans
- Loan repayment

Supporting my child's education

#### Residency

It is now easier for undocumented students and others to meet residency requirements for in-state tuition and state aid. To qualify, students must:

- Earn a high school diploma, GED, or diploma equivalent from anywhere in the United States before their first term.
- Live in Washington for at least 12 consecutive months immediately before their first term for purposes other than college.
- Sign an affidavit saying they meet the above requirements. Students who are not a US citizen, national, or permanent resident will also commit to applying for U.S. permanent residency when eligible.

#### **Aim Higher Washington**

The Aim Higher initiative is a coordinated effort to increase equity in educational attainment by helping more students in Washington apply for financial aid. #### Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA)

The Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA) is accessible at <a href="wsac.wa.gov/wasfa">wsac.wa.gov/wasfa</a>. This application is available to students who are not eligible to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) due to their immigration status, defaulted federal loans, or other issues with federal aid. Students who complete the WASFA will be considered for state financial aid programs only. The WASFA is now available in English and Spanish.

#### **GEAR UP**

#### gearup.wa.gov

GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) is a federally funded program that provides high-poverty school districts with resources to support them in preparing students for postsecondary options. WSAC, Central Washington University, Washington State University, University of Washington, and the Highline School District lead GEAR UP programs serving over 45,000 students in 76 school districts. The WSAC-led program serves over 5,500 students in 26 school districts. WSAC maintains a website of free resources available to schools, students, and families, including family newsletter templates, college visit resources, a scholarship listing, and more. There is also a page focused on COVID-related updates and resources.

The 12th Year Campaign provides free trainings, materials, and other resources to those working with students on admissions and financial aid applications. The 12th Year Campaign can also support districts and schools with their Financial Aid Advising Day. Additionally, the 12th Year Campaign also promotes the Plus 5 Push by encouraging sites using 12th Year Campaign resources and student-level FAFSA data from the secure WSAC portal to increase their financial aid completion by 5 percent.



#### **College Savings Programs-WA 529**

The Guaranteed Education Tuition (GET) Program and the DreamAhead College Investment Plan are Washington's two 529 college savings plans that help families save for future college and career training expenses.

GET and DreamAhead accounts grow tax-deferred and remain tax-free when used for qualified education expenses – tuition, fees, room & board, books, supplies and more. Students can use GET and DreamAhead funds at public or private four-year colleges or universities in the U.S. and even some schools abroad, as well as trade schools and registered apprenticeship programs.

#### **GET**

GET is a 529 prepaid tuition plan that offers Washington residents a peace of mind way to save for higher education. The State guarantees that savings in a GET account will keep pace with changes in-state public tuition rates. Specifically, 100 GET units purchased today will always equal one year of tuition and state-mandated fees at Washington's highest price public university, no matter how much it changes in the future. The GET open enrollment period is November–May each year.



#### **DreamAhead**

DreamAhead is a 529 college investment plan open to anyone in the United States. The plan features various static investment portfolios and self-adjusting, age-based investment portfolios built on low-cost index mutual funds. DreamAhead investors can customize their saving portfolios based on their risk tolerance and student age. DreamAhead enrollment is open year-round.



#### **Scholarship Search**

TheWashBoard.org is committed to increasing access to scholarships and financial aid for Washington students. Launched in 2010, theWashBoard.org, a free, scholarship matching website for Washington students, is a simple and central scholarship search and application resource. Last year, nearly \$12.3 million in scholarships were offered with a minimum of 2,157 available awards on TheWashBoard.org.



#### Need-based financial aid programs

#### **College Bound Scholarship**

#### collegebound.wa.gov

The College Bound Scholarship is an early commitment of state financial aid to cover tuition at public rates, some fees, and a small book allowance at over 65 eligible Washington postsecondary institutions.



This commitment is mostly fulfilled by the Washington College Grant. The application is a two-step process. After being auto-enrolled in 7th, 8th, or in some cases, 9th grade, high school students must fulfill program pledge requirements and meet residency and income requirements. Students must enroll within one year of high school graduation and receive four academic years' worth of funds to be used within five years of high school graduation.

#### **Passport to Careers Program**

This program offers two pathways for foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth seeking a postsecondary degree or career training.

The Passport to College program helps students successfully attend a postsecondary institution by providing a college scholarship and comprehensive support.



The Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program helps students with career-related training under state-approved apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs. Support services and financial aid are provided through ANEW.

#### **Washington College Grant**

The Washington College Grant provides need-based financial aid to Washington students pursuing postsecondary education and access to funding for registered and approved apprenticeship programs. Students who meet eligibility requirements<sup>1</sup> can use the financial aid at Washington's eligible institutions<sup>2</sup>, including public two- and



four-year colleges and universities, and many accredited private/independent colleges, universities, and career schools

in the state. In addition, participants may receive Washington College Grant funding for approved apprenticeship programs available through approved apprenticeship program providers.

In 2022-23, the eligibility thresholds have increased<sup>3</sup> and funds are guaranteed to all eligible students and apprenticeship participants, making the Washington College Grant one of the most generous financial aid programs in the country.

#### **State Work Study**

#### wsac.wa.gov/state-work-study

State Work Study is financial aid for low- and middle-income students. Qualifying students get an approved on- or off-campus job to support their education. Work study builds students' skills, increases their earnings, and reduces reliance on student loans. The state contributes to the wages of work study employees, so participating employers benefit from educated and motivated workers at a lower cost.

#### Merit-based financial aid programs

#### American Indian Endowed Scholarship

The American Indian Endowed Scholarship program provides educational scholarships on a competitive basis to high-achieving resident students, with demonstrated financial need, who have close social and cultural ties to an American Indian tribe or community within the state. Recipients demonstrate academic merit and a commitment to serve the American Indian communities in Washington.

#### **Workforce programs**

#### **Educator Workforce Programs**

#### wsac.wa.gov/teachers

The Washington State Educator Workforce Program provides financial aid to attract and retain teachers to work in subjects or locations of high need known as shortage areas. The program includes options for current teachers, student teachers, paraprofessionals, and non-educators hoping to move into the teaching field. There are conditional scholarships that require teaching service in a public school in exchange for the scholarship funds and one grant that is awarded to applicants with the most financial need who are student teaching at Title I public common schools.

#### **National Guard Grant**

The National Guard Grant helps eligible, actively participating members of the Washington National Guard get an undergraduate degree or certificate. The program provides education opportunities to qualified service members and serves as an incentive to extend their National Guard service. Participants commit to serving one year in the Washington National Guard in exchange for each year of grant funding. Combined with state and federal aid, grants can be used for costs of attendance, such as tuition, fees, room, and board, at approved colleges in Washington, as well as a portion of books and materials.

#### **Dual Credit**

#### Washington College Grant Maximum Usage Standard & Dual Credit

#### wsac.wa.gov/college-credit-high-school

The Washington College Grant (WCG) has a maximum usage standard of 15 quarters/10 semesters or equivalent. The timeframe only applies to the quarters in which a student received the WCG. Because dual credit students cannot receive state financial aid to pay for college credits earned through dual credit, no course work taken in dual credit programs will apply to the WCG maximum usage timeframe<sup>4</sup>. Additionally, students who earn an associate degree through dual credit programs can use WCG toward another associate degree, as long as they are enrolled in an aideligible program.

Maximum usage timeframes differ for state, federal, and institutional financial aid. Dual credit participation may still affect a student's access to financial aid, depending on the type of aid. Students who get close to the maximum timeframe will need to work closely with the financial aid representative at their college/university to maintain eligibility for federal and institutional aid. This issue is most likely to occur for students who graduate high school with a high number of college credits. Colleges and universities also typically include credits earned in dual-credit programs to evaluate satisfactory academic progress (SAP) when determining financial aid eligibility.

#### **College Admissions and Transfers**

#### **Transfers**

#### wsac.wa.gov/transfers

Washington's public community and technical colleges offer transfer associate degrees that make it easier for students to transfer to bachelor's programs in Washington. These degrees transfer to all public and most private four-year colleges and universities.

There are three different transfer associate degrees:

- Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) Associate Degree: Meets most lower division general education requirements at four-year colleges and universities
- Associate of Science Transfer (AS-T) Degree: For students who want to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering
  or science
- Major Related Programs (MRPs): DTA and AS-T plans that prepare students for bachelor's degrees in specific majors such as business, nursing, and computer science

Once admitted to a participating bachelor's degree program, students who complete transfer degrees can generally expect 90 transferrable quarter credits and junior class standing.

#### **College Admissions**

#### wsac.wa.gov/college-admissions

Washington colleges have different admission policies, and some are more selective than others. Public community and technical colleges have an open-admission policy. WSAC works with partners in K-12 and higher education to set minimum admission standards for the state's public baccalaureate schools.

#### **Minimum Admission Standards Policy Update**

WSAC and partners conducted a comprehensive review of The Admission Standards Policy in the spring of 2022. The review was focused on clarifying language for standardized test policies regarding test-optional practices, removing

redundancies in the graduate and professional alternate admissions under option two, and generally strengthening guidance within the policy.

#### **Dual Credit Options**

#### **Running Start**

Running Start allows 11th and 12th grade students to take college courses at Washington's 34 community and technical colleges. Students earn high school and college credits for these courses. Running Start students and their families do not pay tuition for up to 15 college credits, based on combined college and high school FTE of up to 1.2 FTE. Students pay mandatory fees, books, and transportation. Some colleges have grants and waivers to help students with these expenses. Check with the college for details.

Students interested in Running Start may get more information from their high school counseling office or from the Running Start coordinator at their local college. Many colleges offer orientation sessions to help students and families learn more about the program. The entire catalog of courses is available to Running Start students. This includes electives, vocational, online, and advanced course work.

#### College in the High School

College in the High School programs provide collegelevel academic courses to 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students. Courses are taught at the high school by high school teachers with college curriculum, college textbooks, and oversight by college faculty and staff.

- Students pay fees, but typically far less than regular college tuition.
- Students may also pay for textbooks.
- Located at the high school.

#### **CTE Dual Credit**

CTE Dual Credit allows high school students to earn college credit in their high school career and technical education (CTE) classes without leaving their high school campus. CTE Dual Credit used to be called Tech Prep.

- Tuition free.
- Located at the high school.
- Credits apply only to <u>professional-technical</u> certificates or degrees.

An applied baccalaureate (applied bachelor's) degree builds on the education and training from a two-year technical associate degree, allowing graduates to move up the educational and professional ladder without starting over.

#### **Degree Options**

Most community and technical colleges offer a variety of applied bachelor's degrees.

Tuition rates are roughly double the cost of regular community and technical college credits.

#### University and College Transfer

More and more students get started on a bachelor's degree with an associate transfer degree. Students get a high-quality undergraduate experience and save money by starting at a community or technical college and transferring to a Washington four-year college, branch campus, university center, or applied baccalaureate program.

#### Associate transfer degrees

Several options are available, so students should work closely with an advisor to choose the right degree and classes for their educational and career goals. Students should contact the four-year college or university of their choice to fully understand and meet degree requirements before transferring.

#### **High School Diploma Options**

Community and technical colleges offer three ways to earn a high school diploma.

- 1. Earn an associate degree through Running Start, request high school diploma from college
- 2. Earn an associate degree, request high school diploma from college (may require financial aid)
- Earn a high school diploma from the college through one of the following high school completion programs (may require financial aid)

#### **I-BEST**

Washington's nationally renowned Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training program (I-BEST) uses a team-teaching approach to combine adult education

classes with regular, credit-bearing academic or job training classes so students get through school and into jobs faster.

#### Project I-DEA

With I-DEA, English language learners who face the largest language gaps are learning English quickly and in practical ways.

Like I-BEST, this project uses an integrated, teamteaching approach so students learn English in tandem with job skills and life skills. Classes are "flipped": Students learn basic words and ideas online and cement their knowledge in class with the aid of instructors and peers. Computers and 24-hour internet access allow students to learn topics that matter most to them, anytime, anywhere.

#### Competency-based education

Many adult education courses are competency-based; students move through adult education into pre-college (remedial) or college-level courses based on knowledge gained rather than time spent in a classroom. Students move as quickly through courses as their competencies take them.

#### High School Equivalency (HSE)

Many people who did not finish high school have the same knowledge and skills as those who did graduate. By taking and passing a series of HSE tests, adults can demonstrate they have acquired the same level of knowledge. Washington state uses the four-part GED\* tests for its HSE test.

Most colleges and employers accept an HSE credential as being equivalent to a high school diploma. SBCTC oversees the HSE testing program for the State of Washington. Those who meet the eligibility requirements may take the HSE tests at official test centers located throughout the state. You can find a local test center through the GED® Testing Service.

#### High School+

High School+ is a competency-based high school diploma offered at Washington's community and technical colleges for adults who are at least 18 years old. Advisors look at transcripts and knowledge gained from life experience, and work with students to craft an educational plan to fill gaps. To receive a diploma,

students must demonstrate competency in reading, writing, and math in the context of science, history, government, occupational studies, and digital literacy.

# Multicultural/Diversity and Student Leadership

The multicultural/diversity and student leadership offices on our college campuses work to create an environment that welcomes everyone, encourages civic engagement and student involvement, and provides opportunities for student success. They offer events, programs, and spaces that promote understanding, celebrate diversity, and honor different points of view. Their commitment to diversity, social justice, and multiculturalism has earned prestigious awards across the state.

# **Disability Student Services**

Campus disability support service offices ensure equal access to educational programs and services by providing consultation on accommodations (e.g. placement testing, classroom, assistive technology) for students with disabilities who are otherwise qualified for college.

The rights of students with disabilities are different in college from what they were in high school. It is important for high school students and their parents to plan appropriately for their students' transitions to post-secondary institutions. Compared to services at public schools, the services provided by post-secondary institutions may seem minimal.

To be eligible for disability-related services, students must have a disability as defined by the Americans with

Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Under the ADA and Section 504, a person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities (walking, standing, seeing, speaking, hearing, sitting, breathing, and taking care of oneself).

#### <u>Financial Aid</u>

Community and technical colleges award federal, state, college-based grants, and work-study based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA).

Financial aid deadlines vary. Check with the college of your choice for priority dates. We encourage students to apply early.

Colleges widely recommend students planning to attend fall quarter 2022 adhere to the timeline set for College Bound students (February 1).

Those planning to attend winter or spring 2024 should also apply for aid by spring 2023.

#### Scholarships

A variety of scholarships may be available from each college based on financial need, program of study or major, academic merit, leadership or community service. Many colleges offer scholarships through their foundations or list scholarships at their websites.

Most deadlines for fall 2023 scholarships for graduating high school seniors offered by community and technical college foundations will be in February, March and April 2023.

#### **Tuition Waivers**

Certain populations are eligible for full or partial reduction of tuition. Tuition waivers vary by campus, so check with college registration offices.

Some examples: Military veterans, senior citizens, active-duty military/Washington National Guard, children of deceased or disabled law enforcement officers and firefighters, families of fallen soldiers and families of disabled veterans, basic education.



# Student Life, Recreation, Resources

The Activities and Recreation Center (ARC) at Cascadia College and UW Bothell offers a fitness center, food trucks, a game room, meeting and event spaces, and student resources.

The Kodiak Cave is an emergency food resource center located on campus that directly serves the student body of Cascadia College. Kodiak Cave's mission is to end hunger on our campus by providing nourishing meals, education and resources to our community. It currently operates as a "choice pantry", meaning guests will be able to pick the food from the cross-cultural items that best meets their needs. This gives guests dignity as well as comfort because they can choose from items that they are familiar with. It also helps to reduce food waste. Beginning March 2020, Kodiak Cave opened for curbside pick-up and weekly deliveries as well as started offering virtual cooking classes for students to help educate them on nutrition, further reducing waste, and saving money.

# New Degrees & Programs

The Cascadia Scholars Program was implemented to help BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, Persons of Color) and historically marginalized students connect to the college and achieve their educational and career goals. The program offers mentoring, resources, and support for students. Cascadia working with local school districts to provide students of color conferences in 2022. The conference themes include identity, collaboration, education, leadership, and social justice.

Cascadia College is one of two current colleges in partnership with University of Washington to offer new American Indian and Indigenous Studies (AIIS) courses that directly transfer into UW's AIIS degree program. These courses celebrate the contemporary lives and historical local experiences of PNW Indigenous peoples. Through these courses, Cascadia will be centralizing the indigenous experience within its own community culture, as well as collaborating

with tribal groups to help meet their academic and workforce needs.

Cascadia's Networking Infrastructure Technology (NIT) pathway is part of the Cloud Computing Career Launch Program which is a partnership with Amazon's AWS Educate and Washington's technology employers. The program is integrating industry recognized cloud computing curriculum such as security, architecture, and database platforms. By adapting our program (course modifications have started in Fall 2021) with cloud skills, students will obtain the latest job skill and career paths to cloud computing, and provide internship opportunities with industry partners.

# **New Buildings**

STEM 4, a joint venture with UW Bothell, was funded by the legislature during the 2018-19 session. It will house classrooms, labs, study spaces, and faculty offices for both institutions. Construction is progressing rapidly and the project is on schedule for completion for classes to begin fall or winter of 2023.

Cascadia is partnering with Together Center, an organization that envisions a healthy, housed and thriving community where people can easily access a range of compassionate services in one location, to operate a classroom focusing on Running Start and Basic Education courses for residents at the south end of our district.

Cascadia submitted a pre-design report for the college's Gateway Building which will consolidate all our student services and program offices in one location. The goal is to enhance Guided Pathways by designing a building to facilitate Guided Pathways and ensure that every student feels welcomed and supported.

EvCC has eight pathways, which are groups of related degrees and certificates. Each pathway has a team of academic advisors who work with students to create an education plan.

The college offers more than 90 programs, including university transfer degrees and certificates for technical and career fields.

#### Aerospace

EvCC is the home of the Washington State Center of Excellence for Aerospace and Advanced Materials Manufacturing and offers degree programs, certificates, and continuing education for to in-demand jobs in the aerospace industry.

#### Advanced Manufacturing



## **Test Optional for First-Year Applicants**

Gonzaga University does not require an SAT or ACT. Students applying without a test have the same access to everything: admission, automatic merit scholarships, special scholarships, Honors, and direct admission to nursing and engineering. No additional information is required.




