
Who We Are and How We Assist High School Counselors

Whether a student wants to earn a bachelor's degree, is thinking of doing so, or has not yet considered it, there is a place at one of the state's public baccalaureate institutions for students in Washington to earn a bachelor's degree, achieve their dreams, attain further career credentials, and follow their passion.

Undergraduate Student Profile in the Washington Public Four-Year Sector

- 99,746 undergraduates enrolled.
- 52% identify as students of color.
- Over one-third receive a Washington College Grant or Pell Grant, ranking 2nd in the nation for Pell Grant recipients enrolled.
- Nearly half of all College Bound Scholarship students attend a Washington public, four-year institution.
- 82% are Washington residents, representing all 39 counties.
- Average time to degree completion is **3.49 years**, and we're the **largest producer of bachelor's degrees** in Washington.
- We rank 2nd highest in the Western State Region for graduation rates, and above the national average.

Washington's public baccalaureate institutions are **serving to completion** more students who identify as members of underrepresented student populations including students of color, low-income students and students experiencing basic needs insecurity.

Our students are your students. We know students attending a Washington public, four-year institution experience similar rates of basic needs and food insecurity as students in the two-year sector. We are committed to providing the necessary wraparound programs and services to support the whole student until degree completion.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Multiple Paths to Admissions

There are multiple paths to gaining admission to a public university in Washington. These paths are considered equal, with no preference given by the universities to one over another. If your student has concerns about meeting the eligibility requirements for either path, encourage them to reach out to their universities of interest to learn about alternative admissions options. General Admissions	Washington Guaranteed Admissions Program (WAGAP)
Meet Washington minimum admission standards: a 2.0 cumulative, unweighted high school GPA and complete required high school classes. ¹	Cumulative, unweighted high school GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale.
Complete application and send transcripts.	Complete a series of <u>required high school classes</u> .
Admissions offices review high school and college grades, coursework, senior year courses, personal achievements and characteristics.	Meet above criteria guaranteed admissions to WAGAP participating institutions: Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, The Evergreen State College, University of Washington Tacoma, Washington State University and Western Washington University.
All Washington public baccalaureate institutions.	Complete application and send final transcripts.

Applying to College

All Washington public baccalaureate institutions have joined the **Common App**. Students and families through the Common App have the option to complete a single admissions application for our state's public, four-year institutions.

SAT and ACT and Admissions

Students will not be penalized during the admissions process or student eligibility for institutionally supported scholarships, course placement or admissions to Honors programs.

Test Not Considered (EWU, WSU): Institutions do not consider test scores, nor are test scores considered at any point in the admissions review process, even if a student chooses to submit a test score. No additional, alternative measure of college readiness is required in place of a test score.

Test Not Required (UW Bothell, UW Seattle, UW Tacoma): Institutions do not consider test scores in the admissions review process, even if a student chooses to submit a test score (see test not considered above). However, test scores may be considered for placement, entry into Honors program, and/or scholarship awards.

Test Optional (CWU, Evergreen, WWU): Students may choose to submit test scores to strengthen an application. Not submitting test scores will not disadvantage a student. In place of a test score, students who apply may be required to submit additional and alternative measures of college readiness such as successful completion of dual credit coursework, exams, or scores on high school college readiness assessments.

Dual Credit

Washington's public four-year universities and college have a long history of supporting dual credit statewide. The state's public four-year institutions collaborate across sectors to develop policies and practices for quality, student-focused dual credit programs policies and practices to ensure students are successful in attaining their education and career goals. Washington's public, four-year institutions support Advanced Placement, Cambridge International, College in the High School, International Baccalaureate and Running Start without preference. Admission standards are a minimum. Some universities and degree programs may require higher standards. Students who do not meet the minimum should consider <u>alternative admissions</u>.

Holistic Admissions

- Each Washington public baccalaureate institution considers **the whole student** in the admissions review process.
- Holistic admissions consider grades, courses both the type and the level at which taken along with other
 information to make an admissions decision. This may include leadership in activities outside of the school
 environment or other examples a student may provide.
- Every application goes through a holistic assessment process, even if the student applying has not met the state's admissions standards policy.

Return on Investment

Value Added - In Washington and nationally, completing a bachelor's degree continues to be associated with increased lifetime earnings, lower unemployment rates, reduced poverty rates, improved health outcomes, longer life expectancy, and higher rates of civic and social engagement.

Dynamic Education for Current and Future Careers - The demand for workers with postsecondary credentials is higher than it has ever been. We continue to actively engage in the development and review of education pathways and credentials that lead to degrees and outcomes to respond effectively to the changing demands of the current and future workplace.

- Washington employers want to hire local talent to fill these positions whenever possible.
- Over half of the 72% of family-wage jobs in Washington that require a credential after high school will require a bachelor's degree or higher.
- Earning a bachelor's degree is the **only and best predictor within a student's control** for earning a good wage in Washington.
- Participation in college can **make up disadvantages** such as poverty, racism and other structural barriers based on the social capital provided, access to high-quality learning experiences and access to high-impact programs (e.g., internships, study abroad, research).

You are College Material!

If you want to go to college, are thinking of college or have not considered college, there is a place for you in Washington to go to college and achieve your dreams, attain career credentials, and follow your passion.

Recommendations for a successful transition to college:

- Communication with high school counselors and college admissions advisors early and often.
- Apply early!
- Institutions are here to guide students on the next steps.
- Ask about special programs and student support programs and services while in high school.
- Institutions are committed to reaching out and welcoming students.
- Ask questions and seek clarity.
- Remember: Yes, You Can!




About Our Students

- Half of ICW students identify as Black, Indigenous, or persons of color.

- Our graduates make up about 20% of new bachelor's and graduate degree earners in Washington each year.
- In some fields, we are powerhouse producers, conferring 40% of graduate degrees in education, for example, and 55% of nursing graduate degrees in Washington.



About the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction

The goal of Washington's K–12 education system is to prepare every student for postsecondary pathways, careers, and civic engagement. OSPI is the primary agency charged with overseeing public K–12 education in Washington state. Working with the state's 295 public school districts and 6 state-tribal education compact schools, OSPI allocates funding and provides tools, resources, and technical assistance so every student in Washington is provided a high-quality public education.

Equity & Diversity Commitment

Each student, family, and community possesses strengths and cultural knowledge that benefits their peers, educators, and schools. Ensuring educational equity:

- Goes beyond equality; it requires education leaders to examine the ways current policies and practices result in disparate outcomes for our students of color, students living in poverty, students receiving special education and English Learner services, students who identify as LGBTQ+, and highly mobile student populations.
- Requires education leaders to develop an understanding of historical contexts; engage students, families, and
 community representatives as partners in decision-making; and actively dismantle systemic barriers, replacing
 them with policies and practices that ensure all students have access to the instruction and support they need to
 succeed in our schools.

Graduation Pathways (HB 1599, 2019) Implementation

All Washington students must complete a graduation pathway to earn a high school diploma. Passed by Washington lawmakers in House Bill 1599 (2019) and codified in RCW 28A.655.250, graduation pathways replaced the previous requirement that directly tied state assessments to graduation.

Graduation pathways were created as a flexible system that enables students to collaborate with teachers, parents, families, and school counselors to demonstrate career and college readiness (CCR) through multiple options that reflect their evolving interests and goals. Instead of a one-size-fits-all model, these pathway options help students build relevant skills and reach milestones that best prepare them for high school success and their postsecondary goals.

There are no blanket graduation pathways; the pathway a student selects should align with their High School and Beyond Plan (HSBP), which is informed by their goals, strengths, and interests. Graduation pathways are designed to support goal setting and planning by aligning with each student's HSBP, reflect individual interests and postsecondary plans, and prepare students for a range of outcomes including college, careers, apprenticeships, military service, or technical training.

Graduation Pathway Options for the Class of 2025

Graduation pathway options fall under three main categories:

Pathway	Example
ASVAB - AFQT Section Score = 31* Check State Board of Education website by 9/1 annually for an updated minimum score	Student takes the ASVAB as a step toward their goal to enlist in the U.S. Coast Guard
CTE Sequence Complete 2.0 or more CTE credits in the same CTE program area that include either a dual credit course or lead to an industry-recognized credential, or complete a Core + Program. Graduation Pathways and the Statewide Universal HSBP Platform


In 2023, Senate Bill (SB) 5243 passed, revising HSBP requirements and introducing a required transition to a *universal* online HSBP platform, as now codified in RCW 28A.230.212 and 28A.230.215. This singular platform is intended to be user-friendly for students, parents, educators, and other supporters. It will enhance students' academic and career development opportunities, reduce inequities in access to information, and provide greater customization of postsecondary planning and preparation based on individual student needs and interests.

HSBP plays a foundational role in supporting equitable access to academic and graduation pathway planning, career and college exploration, and pathway preparation options. It is designed to help students answer three key guiding questions: Who am I? What can I become? How do I become that? Through the HSBP, students explore their interests, skills, values, and goals, aligning them with potential careers and course options that satisfy graduation requirements and prepare them for postsecondary success. Beginning in 7th grade, students take a career interest and skill inventory to help guide course selection for 8th grade and beyond, with support from school counselors, advisors, or teachers. Students continue to revise and update their personalized plans annually through 12th grade, focusing on next steps that align with their future goals such as apprenticeships, college, entering the workforce, military service, and/or technical training. This marks a shift away from viewing the HSBP as a compliance task toward making it an integral part of school culture that encourages intentional postsecondary planning. Variability in current HSBP implementation across the state has led to inequities for students and families, gaps the universal platform is designed to help close.

Graduation pathways provide greater flexibility, and HSBP data offers the insight needed to systemically adapt course offerings and pathway options to align with students' stated interests and goals within their HSBPs. These new opportunities require schools and districts to reimagine traditional advising structures, which may no longer meet the needs of a more student-centered planning model necessitated by the changes in HB 1599.

It is vital that school systems begin to leverage early HSBP data in long-term planning to ensure student access to the opportunities to pursue courses that will help to best position them to take the next steps to reach their postsecondary goals. This is not a responsibility that lives solely with one department or staff member. It is a community effort where everyone in a school is on hand to build a culture that encourages continuous student postsecondary exploration with a system poised to provide the structure to support their success. This includes building systems that support utilizing student voice in Career and College Readiness development and ensuring that students are supported in completing graduation requirements.

SchooLinks, as the universal platform for HSBP, plays a critical role in this work by providing a centralized system where students can articulate their goals, explore pathways, and track progress toward graduation and postsecondary plans. Its integration across districts ensures consistent data collection, equitable access, and a shared system among staff, students, and families. School staff are also encouraged to take advantage of optional features in SL, such as the College Application Manager (CAM) and Event Scheduler, which are useful tools to streamline this work and strengthen support structures. By fully leveraging the capabilities of SchooLinks, schools can move toward a more cohesive, student-centered system that is responsive to evolving graduation pathway options and individual student aspirations.



The new universal HSBP platform will provide consistent and actionable data to help district and building leaders design relevant courses and pathways that support students' postsecondary plans. Before the passage of HB 1599, schools often built master schedules based on available staffing and then placed students into predetermined structures. With the shift toward incorporating student voice through the HSBP, advising models must evolve to better align with students' goals and aspirations.

This shift requires intentional K–12 alignment of Career & College Readiness programming and supports. Elementary, middle, and high school must share a common understanding of how Career & College Readiness work builds from one grade level to the next, fostering student development by expanding on interests, introducing new concepts, and developing students' individual skills and strengths. This alignment will help students identify and select the most beneficial graduation pathway for their individual journeys and provide a jumpstart to achieve their goals after graduation.

National Student Clearinghouse Data

OSPI is working with <u>Education Research and Data Center (ERDC)</u> to provide information on the postsecondary enrollment and completion outcomes of high school graduates to each school district. Under ERDC's contract with the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC), ERDC is allowed to share aggregate redacted school-level reports with OSPI for distribution to the Local Education Agencies (LEAs) or school districts.

School-level reports generated by NSC will be available at three different points during the year (Fall, Spring and Summer). The longitudinal data in these reports can be used to inform interventions to support students' postsecondary success. Contact your district office for information on how to access these reports.

What's New in 2025-26

Timeframe

Beginning in the 2024-25 academic year, students can now receive College Bound, Passport to Careers, and Washington College Grant (WA Grant) funding for up to six years of enrollment or the equivalent (18 full-time quarters/12 full-time semesters) up to a Bachelor's degree. Beginning in 2025-26, College Bound recipients six year eligibility window begins from the date of receipt of their first CBS award. If a student graduates in June 2025, they have until September 2026 to enroll and their six-year eligibility window begins. If a student graduates in June 2025 and enrolls in September of 2025, the six year eligibility window begins then. Other program requirements—such as attending an eligible college and maintaining satisfactory academic progress—remain unchanged.

College Bound -High School Equivalency Certificate eligibility

Beginning in the 2025-26 academic year, students with a high school equivalency certificate can be eligible to receive College Bound. All students must still meet other College Bound Pledge and program requirements to receive funds.

WA Grant Campaign

The Washington College Grant (WA Grant) campaign has been continued to increase awareness of the WA Grant program. This is a multi-faceted campaign to encourage students, apprentices, and

families to apply for financial aid. WA Grant gives more money to more people for more kinds of education and training beyond high school.

Washington Award for Vocational Excellence

The Washington Award for Vocational Excellence (WAVE) was established by the Legislature in 1984 to help emphasize the importance of career and technical education, and the value of real-world, hands-on learning. The award recognizes high-performing career and technical education (CTE) students at the high school and college levels.

Award values are based on the total number of scholarships awarded, as funding is limited, but can cover up to two years of tuition, according to the tuition charged by the institution students will attend. Due to budget for the 2027 Biennium, WAVE will only be awarding high school and community college students of the 2025-2026 academic year and will be suspended for the 2026-2027 academic year. WAVE is administered by the Workforce Board in collaboration with WSAC, which handles the disbursement of funds. Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) is a competitive federal program that provides six- and seven-year grants to education and community partnerships, as well as states,

to increase the number of low-income students prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education.



The Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) administers the state grant, while Washington State University and the University of Washington manage nine partnership grants. WSAC's state program supports approximately 6,800 students each year, from 7th grade through their first year of postsecondary education, with eligible students receiving scholarships of up to \$800. These organizations collectively serve nearly 38,000 students across the state.

12th Year Campaign

The 12th Year Campaign provides free financial aid trainings, materials, and other resources to those working with students on admissions and financial aid applications. The 12th Year Campaign can also support districts and schools with their Financial Aid Advising Day planning.

OtterBot is a free, texting service designed to help Washington high school students and their parents/guardians through the financial aid and postsecondary education application process. If OtterBot cannot answer a question, it is sent to a WSAC staff member.

College Savings Plans-WA529

Washington's offers two 529 education savings plans, the GET Prepaid Tuition Plan and WA529 Invest Plan. Both plans help families save for future college and career training expenses.

GET and WA529Invest accounts grow tax-deferred and remain tax-free when used for qualified education expenses—tuition, fees, room & board, books, supplies, and more. Students can use GET and WA529 Invest funds at public or private four-year colleges or universities in the U.S. and even some schools abroad, as well as trade schools and registered apprenticeship programs.

GET

GET is a 529 prepaid tuition plan that offers Washington residents a "peace of mind" way to save for higher education. The State guarantees that savings in a GET account will keep pace with changes in-state public tuition rates. Specifically, 100 GET units purchased today will always equal one year of tuition and state-mandated fees at Washington's highest priced public university, no matter how much it changes in the future. GET tuition units can be used for qualified educational expenses at colleges, universities, trade schools nationwide and some schools abroad. The GET open enrollment period runs November through May each year.

WA529 Invest

WA529 Invest is Washington State's direct-sold 529 college and education savings plan, offering families a flexible, tax-advantaged way to save for future education expenses. Earnings grow tax-deferred, and withdrawals are tax-free when used for qualified expenses like tuition, housing, and books. The plan offers a variety of investment options to fit different savings goals and risk preferences. Managed by TIAA-CREF Tuition Financing, Inc., WA529 Invest features low fees, no annual maintenance charge, and user-friendly tools to make saving simple and accessible for anyone, regardless of Washington residency WA529 Invest enrollment is open year-round.

TheWashBoard.org is committed to increasing access to scholarships and financial aid for Washington students. Launched in 2010, theWashBoard.org, a free, scholarship matching website for Washington students, is a simple and central scholarship search and application resource. Last year, nearly \$18.3 million in scholarships were offered with a minimum of 3,741 available awards.



Need-based financial aid programs

College Bound

College Bound is an early commitment of state financial aid to cover tuition at public rates, some fees, and a small book allowance at about 60 eligible Washington postsecondary institutions.

This commitment is mostly covered by the Washington College Grant. The application is a two-step process. After being enrolled in 7th, 8th, or in some cases, 9th grade, high school students must fulfill program requirements and meet residency and income requirements. Students must enroll in college within one year of high school graduation to receive College Bound funds.

This program offers two pathways for foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth seeking a postsecondary degree or career training. The Passport to College program helps students successfully attend a postsecondary institution by providing a college scholarship and comprehensive support. The Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program helps students with career-related training under state-approved apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs. Support services and financial aid are provided through ANEW.

Washington College Grant

The Washington College Grant (WA Grant) provides need-based financial aid to Washington students pursuing postsecondary education and access to funding for registered and approved apprenticeship programs. Students who meet eligibility requirements, can use the financial aid at Washington's eligible institutions., including public two-and four-year colleges and universities, and many accredited private/independent colleges, universities, and career schools in the state. In addition, participants may receive WA Grant funding for approved







apprenticeship programs available through approved apprenticeship program providers.

Making free college or career training possible

In 2022-23, the eligibility thresholds increased, and funds are guaranteed to all eligible students and apprenticeship participants, making the WA Grant one of the most generous financial aid programs in the country. State Work Study

State Work Study is financial aid for low- and middle-income students. Qualifying students get an approved on- or off- campus job to support their education. Work study builds students' skills, increases their earnings, and reduces reliance on student loans. The state contributes to the wages of work study employees, so participating employers benefit from educated and motivated workers at a lower cost. Many employers hire work study students on a permanent basis after graduation.

Merit-based financial aid programs

American Indian Endowed Scholarship

The American Indian Endowed Scholarship program provides educational scholarships on a competitive basis to high-achieving resident students who have close social and cultural ties to an American Indian tribe or community within the state. Recipients must demonstrate financial need, academic merit, and a commitment to serve the American Indian communities in Washington.

Workforce programs

Educator Workforce Programs

The Washington State Educator Workforce Program provides financial aid to attract and retain teachers to work in subjects or locations of high need known as shortage areas. The program includes options for current teachers, student teachers, paraprofessionals, and non-educators hoping to move into the teaching field. The conditional scholarships require the participant to fulfill teaching service in a Washington K-12 public common school in exchange for the scholarship funds. The grant is awarded to applicants with the most financial need who are student teaching in a Washington K-12 Title I public common school.

National Guard Postsecondary Education Grant

The National Guard Postsecondary Education Grant, commonly known as the National Guard Grant, helps eligible, actively participating members of the Washington National Guard and eligible dependents with the costs of

higher education through a conditional scholarship. Participants and sponsors commit to serving one year in the Washington National Guard in exchange for each year of grant funding. Combined with state and federal aid, grants can be used for costs of attendance, such as tuition, fees, room, and board, at approved colleges in Washington, as well as a portion of books and materials.

Dual Credit

WA Grant Maximum Usage Standard & Dual Credit

The Washington College Grant (WA Grant) has a maximum usage standard of 18 quarters/12 semesters or equivalent. The timeframe only applies to the quarters in which a student received the WA Grant. Because dual credit students cannot receive state financial aid to pay for college credits earned through dual credit, no course work taken in dual credit programs will apply to the WA Grant maximum usage timeframe. Additionally, students who earn an associate degree through dual credit programs can use WA Grant toward another associate degree, if they are enrolled in an aid-eligible program.

Dual credit participation may still affect a student's access to financial aid, like federal and institutional aid. Students who get close to the maximum timeframe will need to work closely with the financial aid representative at their college/university to maintain eligibility for federal and institutional aid. This issue is most likely to occur for students who graduate high school with a high number of college credits. Colleges and universities also typically include credits earned in dual-credit programs to evaluate satisfactory academic progress (SAP) when determining financial aid eligibility.

Once a student completes their BA/BS, they are no longer eligible to receive the WA Grant, even if they had not utilized the fulltime limits. College credits earned through dual credit programs may be applied to BA/BS degrees.

College Admissions and Transfers

Washington's public community and technical colleges offer transfer associate degrees that make it easier for students to transfer to bachelor's programs in Washington. These degrees transfer to all public and most private four-year colleges and universities.

There are three different transfer associate degrees:

- Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) Associate Degree: Meets most lower division general education requirements at four-year colleges and universities.
- Associate of Science Transfer (AS-T) Degree: For students who want to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering or science.
- Major Related Programs (MRPs): DTA and AS-T plans that prepare students for bachelor's degrees in specific majors such as business, nursing, and computer science.

Once admitted to a participating bachelor's degree program, students who complete transfer degrees can generally expect 90 transferrable quarter credits and junior class standing.

College Admissions

Washington colleges have different admission policies, and some are more selective than others. Public community and technical colleges have an open-admission policy. WSAC works with partners in K-12 and higher education to set <u>minimum admission standards</u> for the state's public baccalaureate schools.

High schools can choose to participate in a Guaranteed Admissions Program (GAP) - Council of Presidents, a partnership with 6 public baccalaureate schools.

The adopted rules allow school districts to waive the graduation pathway requirement with certain limitations, in addition to permitting a waiver of up to one credit requirement. Emergency waivers may be granted to students graduating in 2020-21 through 2023-24.

Dual Credit Options

Running Start

Running Start allows 11th and 12th grade students to take college courses at Washington's 34 community and technical colleges. Students earn high school and college credits for these courses. Running Start students and their families do not pay tuition for up to a combined college and high school annual FTE of 1.4. Students pay mandatory fees, books, and transportation. Some colleges have grants and waivers to help students with these expenses. Check with the college for details.

Students interested in Running Start may get more information from their high school counseling office or from the Running Start coordinator at their local college. Many colleges offer orientation sessions to help students and families learn more about the program. The entire catalog of courses is available to Running Start students. This includes electives, vocational, online, and advanced course work.

College in the High School

College in the High School programs provide collegelevel academic courses to 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade students. Courses are taught at the high school by high school teachers with college curriculum, college textbooks, and oversight by college faculty and staff.

- Beginning fall 2023, all course fees were removed. All students can participate in these courses at no cost.
- Located at the high school.

CTE Dual Credit

CTE Dual Credit allows high school students to earn college credit in their high school career and technical education (CTE) classes without leaving their high school campus.

Bachelor's Degrees

Washington's community and technical colleges offer bachelor's degrees and applied bachelor's degrees to meet their service area workforce demand.

- An applied baccalaureate (applied bachelor's)

<u>University and College Transfer</u>

More and more students get started on a bachelor's degree with an associate transfer degree. Students get a high-quality undergraduate experience and save money by starting at a community or technical college and transferring to a Washington four-year college, branch campus, university center, or applied baccalaureate program.

Associate transfer degrees

Several options are available, so students should work closely with an advisor to choose the right degree and classes for their educational and career goals. Students should contact the four-year college or university of

their choice to fully understand and meet degree requirements before transferring.

<u>University Centers and Transfer Partnerships</u>

Students can earn an associate transfer degree at a community or technical college and then stay on campus to complete a bachelor's degree from one of our many four-year college or university partners. Options are subject to change.

High School Diploma Options

Community and technical colleges offer three ways to earn a high school diploma.

- 1. Earn an associate degree through Running Start, request high school diploma from college
- 2. Earn an associate degree, request high school diploma from college (may require financial aid)
- 3. Earn a high school diploma from the college through one of the following high school completion programs (may require financial aid)

I-BEST

Washington's nationally renowned Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training program (I-BEST) uses a team-teaching approach to combine adult education classes with regular, credit-bearing academic or job training classes so students get through school and into jobs faster.

Project I-DEA

With I-DEA, English language learners who face the largest language gaps are learning English quickly and in practical ways.

Like I-BEST, this project uses an integrated, teamteaching approach so students learn English in tandem with job skills and life skills. Classes are "flipped": Students learn basic words and ideas online and cement their knowledge in class with the aid of instructors and peers. Computers and 24-hour internet access allow students to learn topics that matter most to them, anytime, anywhere.

Competency-based education

Many adult education courses are competency-based; students move through adult education into pre-college (remedial) or college-level courses based on knowledge

gained rather than time spent in a classroom. Students move as quickly through courses as their competencies take them.

High School Equivalency (HSE)

Many people who did not finish high school have the same knowledge and skills as those who did graduate. By taking and passing a series of HSE tests, adults can demonstrate they have acquired the same level of knowledge. Washington state uses the four-part GED* tests for its HSE test.

Most colleges and employers accept an HSE credential as being equivalent to a high school diploma. SBCTC oversees the HSE testing program for the State of Washington. Those who meet the eligibility requirements may take the HSE tests at official test centers located throughout the state. You can find a local test center through the GED® Testing Service.

High School+

High School+ is a competency-based high school diploma offered at Washington's community and technical colleges for adults who are at least 18 years old. Advisors look at transcripts and knowledge gained from life experience, and work with students to craft an educational plan to fill gaps. To receive a diploma, students must demonstrate competency in reading, writing, and math in the context of science, history, government, occupational studies, and digital literacy.

Sports and Recreation

Community colleges provide a variety of enrichment activities and programs, including intercollegiate athletics. Sports include basketball, baseball, cross country, golf, softball, soccer, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling. Recognizing the time commitment of student-athletes, colleges may fund tuition Grants-in-Aid through scholarships of up to 100% of 15 credit resident operating fees. Multicultural/Diversity and Student Leadership

The multicultural/diversity and student leadership offices on our college campuses work to create an environment that welcomes everyone, encourages civic engagement and student involvement, and provides opportunities for student success. They offer events,

programs, and spaces that promote understanding, celebrate diversity, and honor different points of view. Their commitment to diversity, social justice, and multiculturalism has earned prestigious awards across the state.

Disability Student Services

Campus disability support service offices ensure equal access to educational programs and services by providing consultation on accommodations (e.g. placement testing, classroom, assistive technology) for students with disabilities who are otherwise qualified for college.

The rights of students with disabilities are different in college from what they were in high school. It is important for high school students and their parents to plan appropriately for their students' transitions to post-secondary institutions. Compared to services at public schools, the services provided by post-secondary institutions may seem minimal.

To be eligible for disability-related services, students must have a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Under the ADA and Section 504, a person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities (walking, standing, seeing, speaking, hearing, sitting, breathing, and taking care of oneself).

Financial Aid

Community and technical colleges award federal, state, college-based grants, and work-study based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA).

Financial aid deadlines vary. Check with the college of your choice for priority dates. We encourage students to apply early.

Colleges widely recommend students planning to attend fall quarter adhere to the timeline set for College Bound students (February 1).

Those planning to attend winter or spring quarter should also apply for aid by spring of the previous year.

Scholarships

A variety of scholarships may be available from each college based on financial need, program of study or major, academic merit, leadership or community service. Many colleges offer scholarships through their foundations or list scholarships at their websites.

Most deadlines for fall scholarships for graduating high school seniors offered by community and technical college foundations will be in February, March and April of that year.

Tuition Waivers

Certain populations are eligible for full or partial reduction of tuition. Tuition waivers vary by campus, so check with college registration offices.

Some examples: Military veterans, senior citizens, active-duty military/Washington National Guard, children of deceased or disabled law enforcement officers and firefighters, families of fallen soldiers and families of disabled veterans, basic education.


