


K-12 education system

- 2. At least 70 percent of Washington adults will have a postsecondary credential.

- 26 median age
- 51% part-time
- 57% female
- Approx. 40% students of color
- 22,000 veterans, active duty personnel and assisted dependents

2015 legislative session

- Budget writers continue. Session to end April 26. Special session probable
- 1546 Streamline and expand dual-credit/dual enrollment. Passed 87-11.
- <u>1825</u>/5355 Veterans Residency. Choice Act –Align state residency statutes with Federal VA requirements. Passed both chambers, stuck in committee. Must be implemented by July 1.
- 1706 (CTC) Waive building & activity fees for active duty military. 49-7. Delivered to Governor.
- 1961 Streamline CTC statutes. Governor signed.
- <u>5719/1138/5518</u> Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Task Force/Campus Sexual Violence. All delivered to Governor.
- <u>5179</u> Concerning Paraeducators. Senate won't concur with amendments, House insists.
- 5638 State Need Grant Eligibility. (< ½ time) 91-6. Delivered to Governor.
- 1052 Veterans' Spouses/Early Registration. 45-0. Governor signed. 'Who are receiving benefits.'


Transfer – all for one and one for all



- Effective transfer policy requires continued engagement of the institutions and higher education agencies in the state.
- Is supported by many statewide insector and cross-sector groups and offices involved in various aspects of transfer
- Each of you are of primary importance
- DTA developed over 40 years ago, more than 600,000 students have used this pathway.

- 38% transfer-seeking
- 44% seek workforce education
- 12% seek basic education
- 6% home & family/other/







Applied Baccalaureates

- 2005 Pilot (Bellevue, Olympic, Peninsula, South Seattle)
- 2010- regular status
- 2012-SBCTC approval
- Currently 35 applied baccalaureate degrees at 15 colleges.
- 2015-2016-42 applied baccalaureate degrees at 19 colleges
- Builds off of professional/technical associates degree (e.g. AAS-T)
- Emerging trends: applied management, information technology, nursing, dental hygiene, health infomatics, cyber security

Improvements in Transfer 2013-15

- Developed NEW Nursing degree pathway
- Fine Arts Music DTA MRP, NEW Computer Science Pathway being developed
- Updated Direct Transfer Agreement QSR clarified, eliminated provisos, PE in the DTA
- Reviewed use of Associate of Science Transfer
- Reverse articulation agreements signed
- Eliminated 6 MRPs that were not attracting students

More Improvements in Transfer 2013-15

- Student Transfer Rights and Responsibilities updated, revising guide to Student Transfer in Washington
- State Transfer Liaison activity
- Evaluated consistency of dual credit programs like AP
- CTC clarified coding of nontraditional college credit, including PLA.
 Added PLA to CTC reciprocity agreement. Expanded PLA throughout the system more students, more credits
- Joint SBCTC/COP Policy brief developed
- Campus-based partnerships

Next Steps

- Convene a cross-sector feasibility group Combined Transfer Report
- Expand metrics for transfer: horizontal, reverse, swirling
- Continue monitoring MRPs
- Monitor Transfer Issues via Liaison
- Coordinate with PLA Workgroup –
 policy on military acceptance of credit

ORGANIZATION & FUNDING

- Formed as a result of state legislation in 1996
- Governed by the AZTransfer Steering Committee, which is comprised of representatives from the state's public and tribal community colleges, the three state universities, and the Arizona Board of Regents.
- Funded by these institutions and the Arizona Legislature. Each institution pays annual dues, calculated by the previous year's audited enrollment numbers.


GOALS & OBJECTIVES




SITE VISITS

As reported by Google Analytics




About AZTransfer

ASSIST

- The Arizona State System for Information on Student Transfer (ASSIST) is a relational database containing enrollment and degree information on students attending Arizona's public universities and community college districts.
- The information is made available to participating institutions through a statewide data warehouse.
- Institutions submit a data file at least once a year which contains all student course work, demographic info and degree completion info.


NEW TRANSFERS

FUTURE OF AZTRANSFER

Credit for Prior Learning

Granting college credit based on assessment of a student's prior learning in the workplace, military or through other life experiences can have positive impacts on college affordability, institutional capacity and student success.

Reverse Transfer

When a community college student has transferred to a university prior to completing an associate's degree transfers credits from the university back to the community college to fulfill associate's degree requirements.
